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
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Council to examine paddleboat purchase

In the wake of the purchase of six paddleboats for Fairy Lake from the manufacturer in Peterborough, Halton Hills council is going to be examining recreation department's purchasing policies and procedures.

The owner of Al's Marine in Acton contacted councillors last week to complain that he wasn't given the opportunity to bid to supply the Town with the paddleboats.

Councillor Dave Whiting said Monday he discussed the matter with recreation director Tom Shepard and wasn't at all satisfied with the answers he received.

He said he wasn't concerned just with the purchase of the paddleboats, but felt this' incident raised questions about the purchase of things like canoes for Fairy Lake in past

years. The Town saved \$70 per paddleboat buying directly from the manufacturer, but there are two firms, one in Acton and one in Norval, which sell the same product and hold franchises in this area. Whiting suggested the two local businesses have a grievance with the manufacturer who sold the paddleboats wholesale to Halton Hills. The municipality may have saved some money buying the paddleboats wholesale, but then the local suppliers also pay a lot of

money in property taxes to the Town. Twice last year staff was taken to task by Mayor Peter Pomeroy and council for not tendering purchases so local suppliers can

Whiting sald this new incident raises the question of "where" the recreation department is making its purchases. "Is anything bought locally?"

The businessman who complained to the councillors thought he was overlooked because the Town bought the water craft from the Norval dealer, Credit River Boat Co., because the owner, Bill Pomeroy, is the mayor's brother. Of course, this wasn't at all true. Whiting said, but when planned Town purchases aren't advertised and

tendered such conclusions can understandably be reached.

He said he asked Shepard why the paddleboat purchase wasn't advertised and the recreation director suggested it was in newspaper budget coverage. "That's a lousy attitude. The answer was just a way to get around things."

Shepard wasn't at the council meeting since he is on vacation so Pomeroy directed staff to have the matter put on the next agenda so councillors can get some an-

Pomeroy said afterwards he agrees completely with Whiting. "All meterials, within reason, should be purchased locally." He suggested it appears either the recreation department head doesn't understand the Town purchasing policy or he has violated it. In any event the matter must be clarified and the Town's purchasing policy reviewed with staff again.

Councillor Rick Bonnette noted the Acton paddleboat dealer didn't know the Town was buying the boats until he saw pictures of taff and councillors riding the water craft

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
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
