IN THEIR COUNTRY, THEY WERE KILLED.

On the night of Saturday, June 18th, this young woman and nine other women and teenage girls were secretly hanged by Islamic Revolutionary authorities in Shiraz, Iran.

Their crime was refusal to deny their beliefs. For three days prior to their deaths, they endured barbarous pressures to sign prepared statements converting to Islam, at the hands of Muslim clergymen, who had already murdered the husbands, son and father of four of them.

These women and girls were Bahá'ís. As Bahá'ís they had refrained from any involvement in partisan political agitation. As Bahá'ís they believed that mankind is one human family and that the great religions, including Islam are, in their essence, one. And they believed, to the depths of their beings, that women and men are equal, with equal rights to education, opportunities and respect.

Iran's mullahs regard these beliefs as a "satanic conspiracy" against their Islamic State. In the name of religion, they are engaged in a savage campaign to force Iran's 300,000 Bahá'ís to renounce their faith and convert to Islam:

- Scores of Bahá'ís, including women and girls, have been shot or hanged for refusal to deny their beliefs.
- Thousands of Bahá'í families have been made homeless.
- The pensions of Bahá'ís have been cancelled and their savings confiscated.

Iran's mullahs regard these beliefs as a "satanic conspiracy" against their Islamic State.

So far, the pressure of that united opinion has prevented a tragedy of appalling dimensions. Bahá'ís of other races and cultures, in over 130 countries of the world, have joined together to bring the situation in Iran to the attention of mankind. In publishing this statement to our neighbours and friends, the Bahá'ís of Canada want to express their gratitude to the many humanitarian organizations, women's groups, journalists, leaders of thought, and Canadians of all walks of life who have shown concern and support.

Many of you have asked what you can do to assist. We feel that the most valuable contribution you can make is to express to your Member of Parliament the admiration you feel for the generous and effective efforts Canada has already made and your whole-hearted support for whatever further initiatives are now being considered.

Clergy Comment

Last week I visited with a retired minister who is both a cherished friend and a good theologian rolled up into one.
He had recently acquired an old dog which he had taught some new tricks. Of them all, the one that impressed me most required a doggie biscuit or some other tasty morsel. When placed at the dog's foot it was to remain there as long as my friend said the words "on trust". After what seemed like an agonizingly long and tormenting time, the dog was then permitted to devour the tidbit.
My theologian friend, who sometimes can sound a bit absentminded, said in a moment of reflection, "Too bad God didn't create more dogs and canines and less of the two-legged species." I laughed at the time, but now see the depth of his simple comment.
God has given us, the two-legged species, a world "on trust", but we seem hell-bent on its destruction. We pollute its waters, set fire to its habitations, litter and deface its grounds and, as if that is not enough, we even create mechanisms that could terminate the lives of all canine creatures and children that exist upon it.
Surely we ought to hear the message implicit in that phrase "on trust". If anything, for my friend's dog and so too for us, the pay-off ought to be worth it, in the end.

Blue Ribbon for paper
The Acton Free Press was recently awarded a Blue Ribbon for a strong showing in the Canadian Community Newspaper Association's annual Better Newspapers Competition.
The Free Press earned 83 out of a possible 100 marks in the General Excellence Class Three Broadsheet (circulation 3,500 to 4,499) competition. This paper was fifth in a field of 20 entries from Ontario, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Nova Scotia, and Alberta. Judging was based on two mandatory issue submissions from 1982.
Finishing ahead of the Free Press was the Carleton Place Canadian (Ont.); Quenesl Cariboo Observer (B.C.); Seaforth Huron Expositor (Ont.); and the Goderich Signal Star (Ont.). The leader, Carleton Place Canadian, received a mark of 88.5 out of 100.
The Free Press received 12 of a possible 15 points for its front page; 16 out of 20 for its editorial page; eight out of 10 for news of the community; 13 out of 15 for photos; 13 out of 15 for advertising; 13 out of 15 for typography or page design; and eight out of 10 for local features.
