#### North Halton Sports Camp growing

It seems such a short time ago that the North Halton Sports Camp originated but when the hockey school opens its doors at the Gordon Alcott Arena in Georgetown next Monday it will be for the ninth year and it seems to be getting better each time out.

The Sports Camp runs for three weeks with the first week being a special week for goaltenders. According to organizer Chris Milne some 30 puckstoppers are expected to suit up for the training and lessons.

The final two weeks is designed for skaters but some goaltenders have even registered for those. The response to this year's addition is pleasing to organizers. While some openings are still available they are going fast as registrations seem to have gone up from last year.

The hockey school is run primarily by teachers with Milne, a power skating instructor, heading into his ninth season at the controls. Neil Cotton, a former Georgetown Raider, and high school teacher has shared the load with Chris for seven seasons as does Dale Law.

The Camp opens August 15 but that week has been full for some time with goaltenders taking up a bulk of the load. They will be there learning the finer points of the art of puck stopping from Winnipeg Jets netminder Brian Hayward. Hayward, a former Georgetown hockey grad, will be here for the third straight year but it will be his fist as an NHL'er. He joined the Jets part way through last season and completed the year with the club. He'll get assistance from Neil Cotton.

According to Milne some placings are available for the second week, August 22 to 26, and several openings appear for the final week.

The Camp is designed to help youngster develop in power skating, positional play, passing, shooting, defensive and offensive skills. The youngsters attending the camp are mostly from the area, Georgetown, Acton, Erin, Hillsburgh and Orangeville but at least one from British Columbia will be taking in the camp this season.

The school will use GMHA Midgets and Juveniles to help in the instruction with Dan Curtis, Chris Hodgins, Jon Hammer, Steve Marcolini, and Scott Farley helping out.

Each youngster at the Camp goes through several elements and all get an individual appraisal at the end of the week. They will do fitness training, as well as other conditioning related

The camp catered to 207 young players last season and is over that total for this year. One reason may be the \$85 fee. It hasn't changed in three years. A second child in the same family can register for a second week

The Camp will also provide lunch for \$17 a week.

The Hockey School has no big name players, with the exception of Hayward, endorsing or teaching at the Camp but those that are involved are good at preparing the younger player for the season ahead and teaching the basic fundamentals that will help in the game as the years progress. That's one of the things that help keep the prices reasonable.

Nine years and two hundred kids. It must be doing something right. Maybe the North Halton Sports Camp's preparation and the right coaching this season will help Halton Hills put a few more, Ontario Champions on the map.




