Students building tracks, restoring cars and station

Government grants have enabled Halton's Radial Railway Museum to hire a group of area students for general maintenance and restoration work this summer.

There are three student projects in all. Two of them are sponsored by the federal government, under its Summer Canada program. The other is part of Experience '83—a provincially-funded affair.

Three area students: Elizabeth Koelmei, Robert Bell, and Kathy Johns, represent Experience '83. They are general handypersons; keeping the grounds clean, working in the gift shop, and even restoring an old Montreal and Southern Counties streetcar at the museum.

One of the Summer Canada projects involves restoring the actual railway station. All of the old paint will have to be removed before the structure can be refurbished to the

way it was in the 1920's and '30's. Tim Blandford, Linda Koeslag, and Richard Griffiths work on the station.

The other Summer Canada venture concerns track-building. A track loop will be constructed by this group. They will also be in charge of general maintenance on the present track. Steve Lush, Matthew Iutzi, Karen McBride, Pat Barr, Scott Petty and Chris Milne work in this area.

All employees are from the Guelph, Milton and Acton area, with the exception of McBride, who is originally from Ottawa. She is now in her third year of engineering studies at the University of Guelph.

The station and the track programs will last three and four months, respectively. The Experience '83 students will be employed for nine weeks.

Approximately 75 per cent of the

total program wage costs are covered by grants. The track portion received the largest sum, \$14,462 while the station fund was \$5,000. The grant towards Experience '83 was \$1,754. The museum provided the remainder.

By the end of the summer, the Experience '83 group hopes to have finished the Montreal streetcar. The loop that the track program is currently working on should be completed, however another loop at the east end of the track will still need to be built. The station crew hopes to be completely finished the outside of the station. They have only been working inside on rainy days, so there is still a considerable part of their work left to do.

While this is the first year for the Summer '83 programs at the museum, they have hosted Experience projects for the past five seasons.

Parade, penny carnival for children

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RHOSP holders, please note:

As a result of the changes to the Registered Home Ownership Savings Plan, as announced by the Honourable Marc Lalonde in his budget speech of April 19, 1983, you may now be able to claim an additional tax deduction up to \$10,000 less total contributions made to your RHOSP in previous years if you buy or build a new home.

Current RHOSP holders do not need to make additional contributions to their plans. If you never had an RHOSP but you are eligible for one, you may still claim a tax deduction of up to \$10,000. However, you must buy and move into your new home by March 1, 1985.

You may also make tax-free withdrawals from your plan up to December 31, 1983 to buy certain new furnishings and appliances, such as refrigerators, freezers, or drapes, carpeting and other specific items.
