

Burglars charged

Halton Police are charging three Acton area youths in connection with a break-and-enter last week at the olde Hide House.

A warrant has been issued for one 16-year-old, listed as having no fixed address at the present time. Two others, a 16-year-old Highway 25, Acton resident and a 15-year-old juvenile, have been charged with break-andenter with intent according to police reports.

The offence occurred about 2.50 a.m., Thursday. August 4 when the three youths entered the building by breaking a southside window, causing \$20 damage. They drank four beers which they had found behind the bar counter, then fled when police arrived in response to the building's alarm system.

There were two liquor offences over the weekend, police report. An Acton man was arrested at 1.35 a.m. Saturday, and charged with being intoxicated in a public place. Saturday afternoon, a 48-yearold Acton man was also arrested onthe First Line. Acton, intoxicated in a public place.

Police are investigating a wilful damage complaint on Willow St. on Saturday. Between 12 noon and 1 p.m., a small rock was thrown through the rear window of a parked truck, causing about \$100 damage.
