

Clergy Comment by Rev. Art Tribe

In the tenth chapter of Luke's Gospel, Jesus dispatches 72 of the disciples to precede Him into the villages He planned to visit, and to prepare the people for His coming

Their mission is to explain to the people that Jesus was of God. "Cure the sick there and tell the people the reign of God is at hand". Jesus instructs them.

Later, the 72 return in jubilation. They are anxious to tell Jesus about their success. "Master, even the demons are subject to us in Your Name", they say triumphantly. Jesus answers, "Do not rejoice so much in the fact that the devils are subject to you, as that your names are inscribed in heaven".

He wanted them to understand that they would miss the whole meaning of their discipleship if they saw it in terms of their own glorification. He did not send them out in pursuit of power and prestige. He was saying, in effect, "Do not rejoice in your newly-found exalted status as miracle workers. Do not rejoice over the big lmpression you made on the townspeople by your healing and curing and power over devils. If you depend on these passing things for your life's fulfillment, you are heading for a fall. They will let you down. The reason your names are inscribed in heaven is that you are following Me in doing God's will. Obedience to God's will is the only genuine source of your life's fulfillment as human persons. Obedience to God's will is the only genuine source of the abundant life that I am offering to those who follow Me".

In "The Screwtape Letters" by C. S. Lewis, Satan is giving instruction to his demon followers, preparing them for their hellish mission to the world. He says, "Our cause is never more in danger than when a human, no longer desiring but still intending to do God's will, looks around upon a universe from which every trace of God seems to have vanished, and askes why he has been forsaken and still obeys."

There is one basic concept in our understanding of what Jesus is all about that has profound implications for our own lives today. The fact of the matter is that all through His life Jesus understood His own ministry of obedience to the Father's will primarily in terms of loving service to other persons. He was what the later Church came to call. The "Servant Leader".

But, His disciples never understood this. Out in the wilderness, you remember, when Jesus fed 5,000 of His followers the loaves and fishes, they tried to make Him, their King, but He refused, and the people didn't understand. When He rode into Jerusalem on a little donkey, the crowds welcomed Him as their King. But He certainly didn't act like a king, and the people didn't understand. On the night before His death, when He knelt down on the floor of the upper room and, in a servant's role, washed the disciples' feet, they didn't want to accept Him in that role. They didn't understand.

Finally, on the Cross—the culmination of the Servant's Role, He revealed to them the depth of His willingness to suffer, even to die for others, and they didn't understand. And now, two thousand years later, it is evident that many of us do not understand. And for this reason we are kept from getting close to Jesus and what He was doing for us.

Instead of coming into the world as a great Davidic King-Messiah, Jesus was born in a stable. After His Baptism, He went out into the wilderness where He was tempted with the very things that Kings possess: economic power, military power, political power, personal charismatic power. And one-by-one He rejected the temptation to use these powers.

Several years ago, Leo Durocher, of baseball fame, gave an interview to a reporter from "Sports Illustrated" magazine. The reporter asked about the famous statement attributed to the fiery Durocher, "Nice guys never win". Leo replied, "I never said that at all. What I said was that if I were playing third base and my mother came tearing around the bases and was about to score the winning run, I would tripher up". It's the one who wins the game, it's the one who ends up on top, it's the one with the high salary, it's the one who is in a position to manipulate and dominate whom we admire.

But, it is not through this kind of power and it is not through this kind of leadership that God primarily works His will among us and reveals the fullness of His Rule. Rather, it is through His obedient servant-leaders, His servant-people.
