

manganese problem. Hence Acton's present water shortage would be solved and growth of the community to a population of 10,000 people could be realized.

However, the province and Credit Valley Conservation Authority now says the well can't be turned on until it is determined if running the Prospect Park well will deplete water levels in the Black Creek and Fairy Lake. The "legal issue surrounding the taking of water from Prospect Park and the potential impact on the Canada Packers Ltd. (Beardmore tannery) operation must also be determined," the report adds.

The region has long relied on the Prospect Park well to solve Acton's water problems. Region staff is now also urging test drilling in the vicinity of the existing Fourth Line well at an estimated cost of \$20,000. They are finally looking for an alternative source of water.

Staff has urged that until the water problem is solved not only should the Danville project not proceed, but all new applications for developments be ruled premature.
