Third low gross went to a former Acton Open junior champion, Dugald Dick, who shot a 78. A six on the par-three second hole might have cost Dugald a shot at the championship.

Two former junior champs wound up onetwo in the low net division. Dave Johnson was first low net, and Bob McLure was second low net. Both these fellows are solid young golfers, and we expect each to be Acton Open winners in the years to come. Third low net went to Gib Hay, who shoots

a steady round of golf whenever he plays. Senior trophy winners were: age 50-60, Don Grein with an 82; 60-65 Bill Nicolak with an 82; and 65-and-over, Mick Holmes with an 82. This 82 is the same score Mick shot to win the Acton Open twenty-five years ago.

Because of the near-perfect weather conditions, and the calibre of the golfers, scores were on the low side all day. The committee thanks all the participants, and invites them all back to the 1984 Open.

Two multiple Open winners were unable to attend. Dwayne Hay, our current champion, was on vacation, and Rev. Andy McKenzie wound up in hospital just days before the event. We missed both of them, and wish Andy a speedy recovery.

### Ukie" has never missed an Open

Julian 'Ukie' Zajac teed-off Saturday morning for his 30th official and unofficial Acton Open golf tournament.

The only person who has played in all 25 official Acton Opens, and about 60 other past award-winners in the local tourney played in the Hall-of-Fame or day-of-champions tournament at Acton Meadows.

But Ukie and some other golfers on hand Saturday also played in the four unofficial Acton opens prior to 1958.

The Acton Open hasn't always been played at the Meadows. In fact Halton Heights has been the site of the most tourneys-seven. Erin's Hilltop was the scene of six Opens. Other host courses have included Orangeville, Fairview in Guelph, Georgetown, Birch Hills (now Halton Heights) and Hornby Towers.

Ukie said the last tournament held in Erin, he couldn't recall the year, (it actually

appears to have been the third last at Erin. in 1963) was his favorite and most memorable of the 25, because it was his best performance. He fired a 77, just one shot off

the pace set by Rev. Andrew McKenzie. Zajac and another veteran of many Acton Opens, John Goy Sr., remembered how it all started in 1954, when 16 local golfers got together for a tournament in Orangeville. Over the next three years the number of participants grew until it was decided the event should be made official and open to everyone.

They noted the Open has changed a lot over the years. Players used to pack a lunch for the day and bring along some beer. There weren't many trophies up for grabs in the early events either.

Today, lots of awards and prizes and a big banquet are features of the Open.

Goy and Zajac recalled some of the names of the early participants: Mick Holmes, Bill

Coon, Rev. McKenzie, Dr. Brian Moore, Andy Nolan, Gord Beatty, Roy Butler, Roy Goodwin, Don Black, Jack Drysdale, Pat Dophin, Don Ryder,

Back when the Open started it was played in Orangeville because there was no course in Acton or Erin.

George Houston, brother of Hollywood director Walter Houston, ran the course and it didn't have a liquor licence.

Lack of a liquor licence wasn't a big obstacle though, Goy remembered, because George "bootlegged" some spirits to the players.

The local squad qualified for the Provinclal Championships last week and made no mistakes. They claimed the Ontario Junior C title going undefeated in the double knock-out tourney.

The A's are in their first year of existance as a Junior club, but have been terrorizing several area teams at the junior and industrial level for some time and most people knew it would only be a matter of time before the team cashed in with some big prize.

Fortunately for the blue, red and white it went their way as they scored a solo run in the bottom of the tenth, notching a 3-2 victory and setting up a meeting the local squad was awaiting.

All season long Maryhill had been Acton's goliath in Ontario Junior Fastball League play as the opposition won all three meetings, but the Ontario championships were different.

The A's were fired up and got by giants with their second straight extra inning win. defeating Maryhill 3-2.

it gave the A's the easy route to the crown, as they sat and waited while Maryhill battled with Port Perry for the right to play the A's. Maryhill scored a 9-1 win and it was Maryhill against Acton one more time, this time with the Ontario Championship Trophy at stake.

The A's made no mistake, Maryhill needed to win two in a row from Acton, but the locals weren't intending to give them any victories, scoring a 3-1 win to claim the 35-year-old Jim Tebworth Memorial Trophy, emblematic of being Ontario's Junior "C" Fastball Champions.

The A's started slowly in the tourney playing "very poorly" in their opening game according to coach Marshall, but they managed to gain the much needed first win despite being outhit nine to three.

Carrying Place's lead off batter claimed the lone run for his side and it wasn't until the fourth that the A's found the equalizer. Kelly McArthur led off the inning with a triple and scored as Roy Spear sacrificed him to the plate.

The A's held their opposition at bay until they could manage the one more run they needed. Roy Spear's triple to lead off the \_\_ run. final inning was the blow Acton needed. Tim Evans laid down a perfect bunt and Spear touched the plate with the winning tally.

Dick Spear started on the mount for the

A second error by the Caledonia infield allowed Scott to score on a unique play. According to Marshall he sent Scott around third toward the plate, but speedster was caught cold. As the catcher went down to make the tag Scott tried the high hurdles landing on the plate avoiding the tag and forcing the game to go into further extra innings. "Safe, time, I don't believe it," was the comment from the umpire according to Marshall as he smiled while visualizing the play again on Monday.

The hurdle paid off as the A's came back in the tenth as Mark Duval led off the inning with a single, scoring as Rusty Elliott put a ball in play.

Roy Spear went the distance for the A's allowing just five hits in ten innings andrecording 12 strike-outs. Acton claimed only two hits with Gord McArthur and Duval picking up those.
