the fair's official opening was performed by his Honor Lt. Governor Ross.

The fair continued to grow, introducing many new attractions. It was 48 years ago that the first Acton fair dance was held in the Acton town hall.

In 1936 and 1937 attendance was down due to the prevalence of infantile paralysis.

For the first time in Acton's history, the fair was held on Friday and Saturday in 1942 since Orangeville was having their Fair the same Tuesday and Wednesday each year.

The first peace-time fair in six years, the 1945 fair had 5,000 people with an additional 3,000 attending the following year.

Every year gate receipts continued to increase as the fair began to flourish. The heaviest rain since 1913 practically made it impossible to carry out the 1951 Acton Fair. Only 2,500 attended.

In 1958 a separate ladies' division was formed under Mrs. R. L. McEney as president and Mrs. Ralph Denny as Secretary-Treasurer.

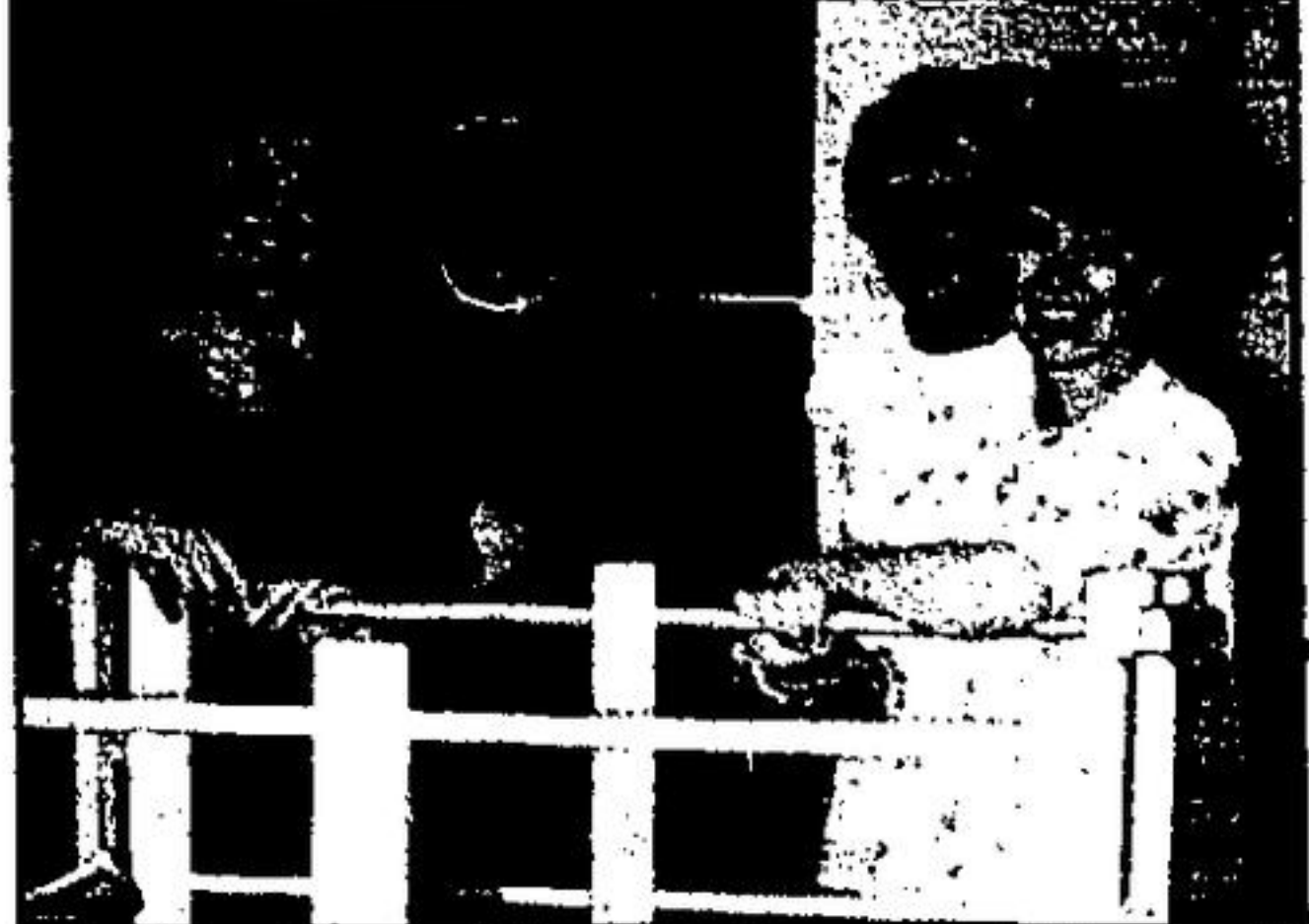
The 1963 fair had for the first time, a brother sister combination with Calvin Aitken as president and Irene Swackhamer as Secretary-Treasurer.

Acton fair travelled through the 70's and has grown to become a "B" class fair, well known throughout the province for its active members and innovative attractions.

Today Acton boasts an Arabian, English and Western horse show, a pony show, a full beef and dairy cattle competition. Poultry, sheep, swine, heavy and light horse shows are all part of Acton Fair.

Horse pulls, tractor pulls, 4x4 truck pulls, pet show, model boat races, tug of war, pioneer games and much more.

The ladies' section overflows the arena with exhibits.
