And just to refresh the memories of Acton fans: "It's really a pretty scientific game," explains Steve. "It's not as rough as people think."

"Yeah," agrees Rob. "There are a lot of misconceptions about lacrosse."

Both players agree that there are many players in Acton who would and could play lacrosse if there were teams to play for. They are working on getting some of their friends out to Orangeville for next season.
