

Modern square dance is for fun and fitness

Modern square dancing is a lot of fun and good for fitness too! Most of us remember old-time square dancing in which the calls were done to a fiddle or two and a piano. Many of the calls were repetitive and some were very boisterous!

Modern square dancing is called to the accompaniment of a record using modern music. There are approximately 75 basic moves that are taught in beginners classes. Many are the same as the old-time calls such as "do-sido" "Grand chain all". But there are differences.

The caller in modern square dancing will put the moves together in a "patter" dance that is not repetitive but is choreographed. The modern square dance caller will then use the same moves in a "singing" call

which allows dancers to enjoy the music and the moves as they practise their steps.

In Halton Hills the Pine Valley Square Dance Club is a modern square dance club teaching beginners classes and running a mainstream club as well. Wes and Jackie McCarthy from Brampton are the club callers. Wes calls the squares and Jackie cues round dances.

Beginners classes are held at Stewarttown Hall on Wednesday nights from 8:00-10:30 p.m. The Mainstream Club meets on Tuesday nights (8:00-10:30 p.m.) at Stewarttown Senior Public School.

Each year the American and Canadian Square and Round Dance Associations sponsors Square Dance Weeks. This year

Square Dance Weeks are Sept. 12-17 and Sept. 19-25.

Modern square dancing is done for fun and enjoyment all over the world. Calls are usually in English and visitors are always welcomed with the same hospitality fellowship and fun that they enjoy back home. 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Welfare cases down in Halton

General Welfare Assistance caseloads in Halton Region declined steadily during the months April, May and June, and in some cases were lower than predicted.

In a report to the Health and Social Services Committee, Ms. D. Oakley, director of social services said, "The decrease in caseloads is a reflection of increased seasonal employment." She said that during the first quarter of 1983, the employable caseloads accounted for more than half of the total, but during the second quarter declined to around 45 per cent.

Predicted caseloads were 8.7 per cent higher than actual for the April and 9.2 per cent higher for June.

Oakley also said, "We expect this downward trend to continue until September, at which point cases should start climbing again."

While actual net expenditures for the first six months of 1983 were about three per cent lower than expected, the report gave a bleak comparison to 1982 which indicated that welfare assistance spending in the region was 53.2 per cent higher in 1983.

'84 earliest action on child porn laws

There won't be any legislative action on child pornography until 1984 at the earliest, Minister of Justice Mark MacGuigan informed Halton Board of Education. The Minister was responding to a motion from the board asking for government action on child pornography.

MacGuigan, while saying he was sympathetic to the board's opinion, pointed out that Bill C-53, a bill to cope with problem, introduced by his predecessor, did not meet with the approval of all members of the Standing Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs. MacGuigan contended the impasse showed more research was necessary.

He said he would be in a better position to respond after the report from the Committee on Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children report is completed in early 1984.

Councillor Pam Sheldon wants some kind of warning sign put up on 22 Sideroad west of the Fourth Line in an area of the road which is curving and narrow. She said drivers don't know in advance the road will narrow down to one vehicle width and it is a dangerous spot.

Engineer Robert Austin said he'd bring the matter to the attention of the region which has jurisdiction over the road.

Sheldon raised her concern at last Tuesday's council meeting.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK APRICOT BREAD

¼ tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt

EXPROPRIATIONS ACT NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

IN THE MATTER OF an application by Her Majesty the Queen in right of Ontario as represented by the Minister of Government Services (expropriating authority) for approval to expropriate land, being part Lot 7 in Concession 10, in the Town of Halton Hills, in the Regional Municipality of Halton, (formerly in the Township of Esquesing, in the County of Halton) in the Province of Ontario, for a police telecommunications tower.


NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the lands more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto.

Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonably necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing.

- In the case of a registered owner, served personally or by registered mail within thirty days after he is served with the notice, or when he is served by publication, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice;
- In the case of an owner who is not a registered owner, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice.

NOTES:

- The Expropriations Act provides that:
 - where an inquiry is requested, it shall be conducted by an inquiry officer appointed by the Attorney General;
 - the inquiry officer,
 - shall give every party to the inquiry an opportunity to present evidence and argument and to examine and cross-examine witnesses, either personally or by his counsel or agent, and
 - may recommend to the approving authority that a party to the inquiry be paid a fixed amount for his costs of the inquiry not to exceed \$200 and the approving authority may in its discretion order the expropriating authority to pay such costs forthwith.
- "owner" and "registered owner" are defined in the Act as follows:

"owner" includes a mortgagee, tenant, execution creditor, a person entitled to a limited estate or interest in land, a committee of the estate of a mentally incompetent person or of a person incapable of managing his affairs, and a guardian, executor, administrator or trustee in whom land is vested;

"registered owner" means an owner of land whose interest in the land is defined and whose name is specified in an instrument in the proper land registry or sheriff's office, and includes a person shown as a tenant of land on the last revised assessment roll.
- The expropriating authority, each owner who notifies the approving authority that he desires a hearing in respect of the lands intended to be expropriated and any owner added as a party by the inquiry officer are parties to the inquiry.
