Fox Run raises \$11,300

The cold air and rain didn't damage Acton's efforts to raise money to keep Terry's dream alive Sunday.

The third annual Terry Fox Run has brought in an estimated \$11,300.; a big in-

crease over last year's plus \$10,000. total. This revenue increase has been realized despite the fact the number of participants slumped from roughly 225 a year ago to

about 130 on Sunday.

he revealed he'd been told numbers of participants were down all over because of the lousy weather. In Acton participants just kept circling the

track at Acton High School and volunteers stood by their lap counting, snack bar, registration and records posts, right through the morning's heaviest rains.

The pledges were healthy. Many people had pledges in the hundreds of dollars, Peter Casa had a remarkable \$735 worth of pledges.

There were also \$175 in donations and entry fees collected. Some pleasant news for the committee came after the Challenge of the Acton Stars competition at the Fair Sunday afternoon when the winning Curling Club entry donated their \$100 prize to their favorite charity, Terry's dream.

"We're grateful to all the volunteers and participants for the way they carried on through the rain. We're proud of Acton, the way the community came through," Hurst declared.

Area man is killed

An RR 5 Rockwood man was killed late Saturday afternoon when his motorcycle was in collision with a car near St. Catherines.

Robert Somerville, 26, was pronounced dead on arrival at Hotel Dieu Hospital, St. Catherines, after his bike was in collision with a car on Niagara Regional Road 81. just west of Jordan Valley.

Niagara Regional Police are not releasing the name of the driver of the car, but say she escaped injury.

A passenger on the motorcycle, Susan Costello, 21, of Cobourg, was taken to West Lincoln Hospital in Grimsby with multiple fractures and is listed in stable condition.

Police say Somerville was travelling westbound on Rd. 81, about 4.30 p.m. near the flea market when he lost control of the vehicle and entered the eastbound lane, colliding with the car.

Somerville was a chemist, working with Reiders' Distiller in Vincland and is survived by his mother, Margaret; brother William, of Guelph; and sister Linda at home at RR 5 Rockwood. He is also survived by his grandparents, Jack and Ethel Somerville, Guelph, and William Weir, RR 5 Rockwood. He was predeceased by his father, Gordon.

Funeral service will be held today (Wednesday) at 1.30 at the Wall-Custance Funeral Home, Guelph. Interment is at Johnson Cemetery, near Barrie Hill. Rev. Robert Hyde is the officiating minister.






