Bruce Shannon, 18, is actively involved in high school sports.

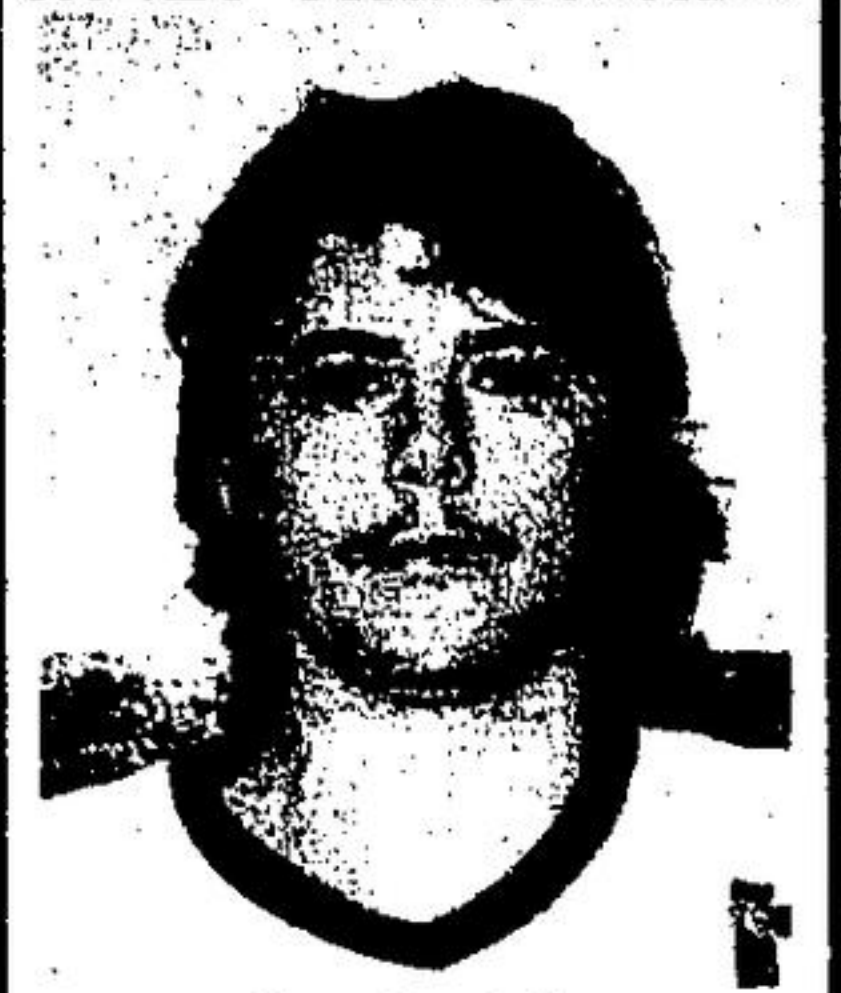

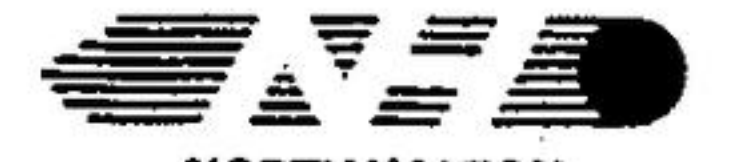


Ken Franklin
