Police beat

Thieves netted \$2,100 in goods from a break-in at RR1, Acton home during the daylight hours, Thursday. Entry was gained by breaking a small, front-door window, reaching inside and unlocking the door. Stolen was a VHS Panasonic video-cassette recorder, an Atari home-computer, blank video tapes, computer games and a tape recorder.

A break-in at a Lot 32, Concession 4, Acton home resulted in the theft of a '79 Yamaha dirt bike, valued at \$700. Police report the bike was in a residential garage that had its padlock forced sometime during the night, Wednesday-Thursday.

A 29-year-old female from Toronto was charged with assaulting a Storey Dr. resident's 12-year-old daughter on October 18 around 1:30 p.m. The woman was visiting Acton and hit the girl causing mouth cuts and a bloody nose.

A 19-year-old Acton man was charged with impaired driving Friday at about 1:40 a.m. after being caught driving erratically on Ransom St.

A 20-year-old Acton man was stopped by a police officer Saturday night for a liquor offence when the youth punched the officer in the face. The man was charged with assaulting a police officer and was also charged with possession of narcotics after some suspected hashish was found in a foil wrapper on his person.

A 56-year-old Cameron St. resident was charged with pointing a firearm and possession of a weapon dangerous to the public peace Saturday, after a visitor to the man's home claimed a revolver was pointed at this throat and the resident threatened to kill him. The visitor fled and called police, who later arrested the man. A search of the home failed to turn up a firearm.

Late one night I was startled by the ringing of the telephone; sleepily I answered it, only to hear a teen voice crying out on the other end for help. She said, "I want to get away from my family. No one understands me any more. I don't feel that my family really loves or cares for me. I'm alone, confused, what can I do?"

This is just an example of a situation which is occurring more frequently than we would like to admit. The parent-child clash seems to be evident!

What is the problem? Are parents not fulfilling their role of "training up a child in the way he should go..." (Proverbs 22:6)? Or are children rebelling against the discipline because of society which promotes doing your own thing?

Many books and articles have been written on child-rearing. You can pick your personal choice.
