(The quote above came from a graduation speech writer Kurt Vonnegut Jr. gave in 1978 to students in Fredonia, New York.)


"There will be times in our lives when we will have to leave the beaten path and clear our own trail. At least I hope there will be.



Parking permits for disabled

Permits will be issued to the handicapped to permit parking in their own designated

spots. The Town will recognize the provincially issued licence plates for the handicapped, so a permit from the Town will not be neccesary for the holders of these plates.

Bylaw Enforcement Officer Jack Lusty explained the permit will be issued to the person, rather than the car. This will allow handicapped people, who do not drive, to use the permit on another vehicle. The permit will be inside the car either on the dashboard or on the sun visor, where it is visible from outside.

Lusty pointed out some handicapped people do not want the provincial plates identifying them as handicapped, so for them the Town permits will be necessary.

The Town will designate spots on Townowned parking lots as spaces for the handicapped, and will choose places closest to walkways, or streets. In privately owned lots the Town will ask the cooperation of the owners. In most plazas this has already been done.

Penalties for ignoring the bylaw are not light. The fine is up to \$2,000.
