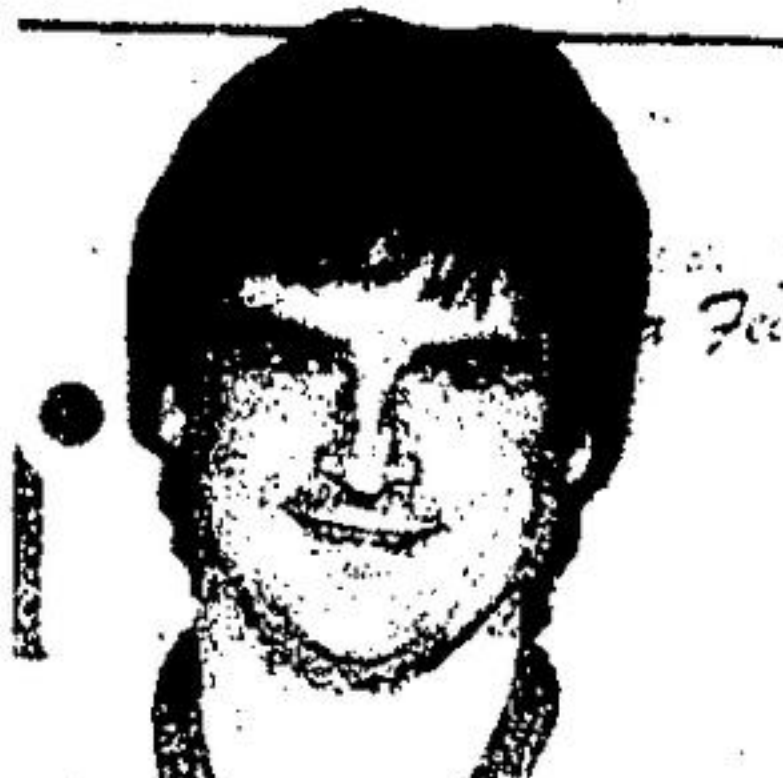

These candidate areas are outlined on the accompanying map. The consultants are about to begin the next stage in the study where the candidate areas will be further investigated to identify candidate sites. The candidate sites will be subject to more detailed study to select a preferred site or sites for Halton's landfill.

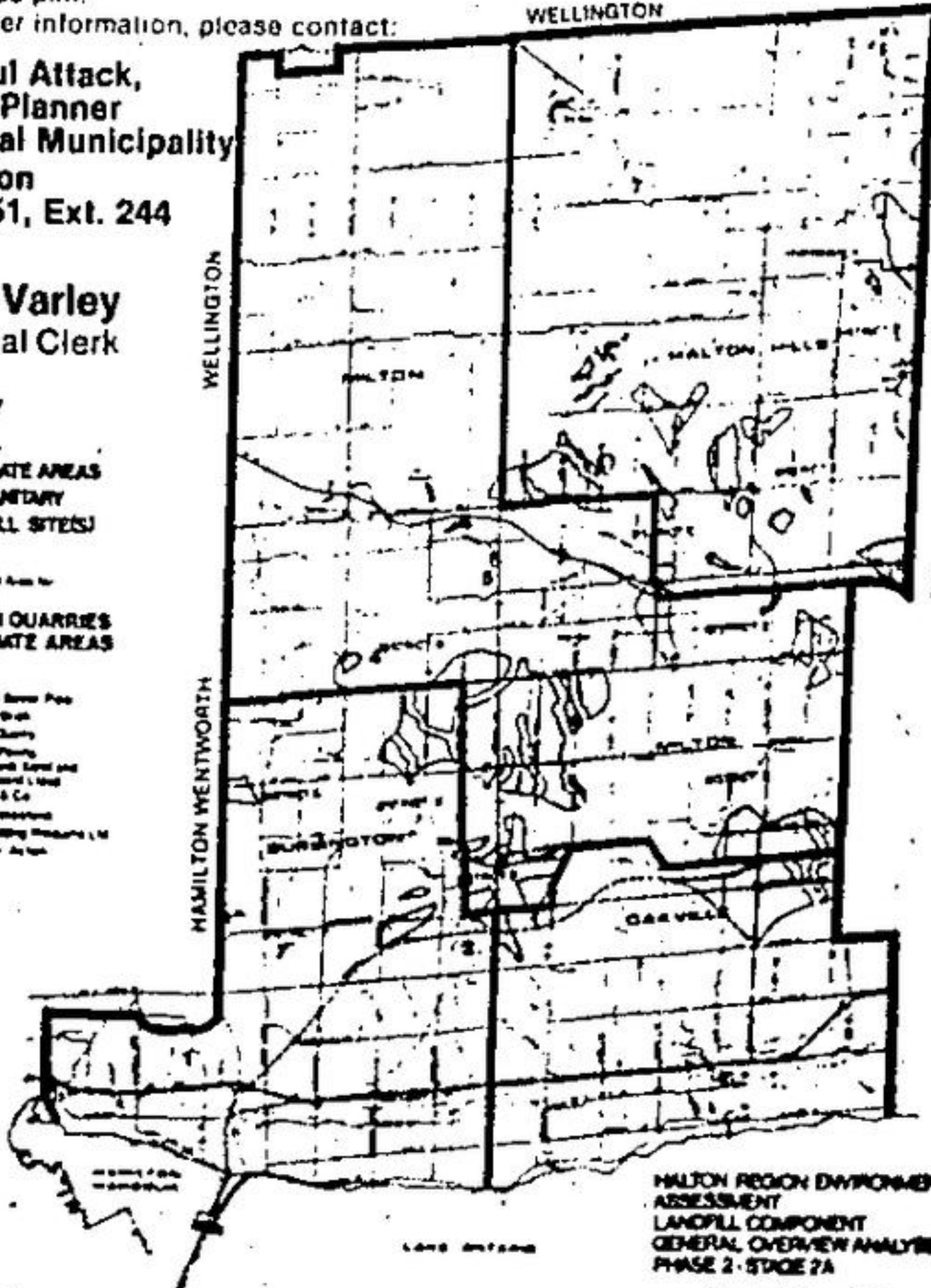
