# End in sight for town hall restoration, need to raise funds

The end of the mammoth town hall restoration project is now clearly in sight. Heritage Acton spokesman Ted Tyler says. There are only small bits and pieces of

work remaining on the roof and exterior walls, he reported in an interview this week. Also the building now has temporary beat, half of the electrical work has been completed, most of the insulation is in and drywalling is being done now. The new chimney is 75 per cent completed.

"Our biggest problem now is while we have lots of money left to pay for labor, we could use some more funds for materials. The materials budget is really tight now," Tyler explained.

Some changes made along the way by the architect and engineer have resulted in some extra costs which weren't expected, such as the need for much more steel for reinforcing, Tyler said. Unexpected changes in plans have put a big dent in the

materials portion of the project's budget. "We'll accept donations, in fact we've received some lately. There was \$5,500 in donations in one week recently," Tyler said. They are also eager to see the community "help us go the last mile" on the project by buying Actario tickets.

Bringing the Town Hall lottery, Actario. back to life hasn't been easy. There's only a handful of people on the Heritage Acton committee and to make a draw go you need lots of ticket sellers. Tyler explained the first two years of Actario, community organizations sold tickets and earned commissions. But they haven't climbed on the bandwagon this time around. They are looking for ticket sellers as well as lots of buyers.

The Actario draws at the town hall start again on December 10 and there will be four weeks of draws ending December 31. Tickets are just \$10 for four weeks and there

will be three cash prizes drawn weekly, \$200. \$100, and \$50. As well, the final week's draw will feature not just the cash prizes but a trip draw too, valued at between \$1,200 and \$1,500, or the winner can take \$1,000 cash. After they see how the first month's draw

sells they'll decide if they should run more. "We found it easier selling tickets at \$100 for a year than it is seiling \$10 tickets for a month. We've got to make money on this," Tyler declared.

Tickets are available from committee

members or at stores displaying Actario "If we can raise \$15,000 to \$20,000 things would look really great. Then we could do her (the town hall) up good. I don't want people thinking we are falling on our faces.

We'll finish the project for sure. I think

we've done really well. We only had a bud-

get of just over \$180,000 compared to the

If and when an addition on the south side of the building can go shead, the plans are all drawn up. Heritage Acton has a line on a new grant to fund this addition, but they'll have to raise funds for that too.

There are also signs they'll be successful in securing a small provincial grant which would pay for materials and labor not covered in previous grants. This is an ongoing grant, Tyler explained, and they'd receive funds for 1983 as well as the next three years. However, to secure this grant they'd again have to raise some funds because it is a "matching dollars" type of grant. The maximum they can receive yearly would be \$2,000.

This grant could be used for things like new windows for the hall, some windows

have just been patched for now.

As for New Year's Eve at the town hall. Tyler says there's still a good chance they'll have a dance, an orchestra has been booked. However, it won't be a big grand opening affair. They still plan a gala formal opening for the restored hall, but that will have to wait until next year.


Tyler explained all they have to do is complete the second floor auditorium and have the washrooms finished, and they can hold a . .

"The town says we can occupy the parts of the building which are completed as long as the hall is structurally sound, which it is now," he said.

If there is an event at the town hall New Year's Eve. Tyler says it will simply be a fund raising event. He added he should have definite word on plans for the night of December 31 very soon.

# Drop charges

The 1982 Ford had about \$6,000 damage done to it. Both driver and passenger were taken to Georgetown hospital.



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
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
