from elementary to secondary school will result.

Many people have felt these changes are getting "back to the basics," Dr. Stephenson contended. She feels it is more than that. It is an opportunity for students to pursue excellence "which is really the direction we have been trying to give them all these years."

This program, she admitted, will require co-operation by everyone who is involved. A greater commitment and greater responsibility from the students is required, and more support from parents and teachers is also needed, as well as the co-operation of members of the community.

"Schools will do their part, but they cannot achieve success by themselves. They must have the support of the parent."






