

Heaver's report revealed failures (retentions) and/or accelerations occurred most frequently in the primary grades as compared to the other two divisions.

"It is apparent, therefore, that primary grade teachers provide a significant diagnostic role in identifying and providing unique needs," the report said.

A table drawn up by Heaver showed the most accelerations were in grade 3 at 16, out 2608 students. Grade one had the most failures with 114 out of 2225 pupils.

disappointing" falling short of \$4,000 goal by
