Following a meeting December 5 between the Acton Sahres Junior B Hockey Executive and a Midas Muffler franchise owner. "Godwin Carachi, the local club now has a new sponsor, owner and chairman of the board.

According to both Carachl and the Sabres General Manager, Frank Allsop, the Sabres can expect several changes for the better in the pear future.

"I'd like to see what kind of team the existing management can put together," he added, 'so there won't be a lot of major changes in the executive or the coaching staff right away."

"Mr. Allsop and I will be working together for the next few months," continued Carachi, "and hopefully by the end of January all the legal problems and paperwork will be solved."

"You should see an improvement in the team before the season is finished," commented Carachi, "and when the team improves I think the increased community support will look after itself."

Carachi owns three Midas Mulfler franchises and is currently running a cattle and horse farm just south of Acton on Highway 25. He said he felt the purchase of the

Sabres would be good for the community and since it's the first team he's ever owned he hopes for a lot of community support.

Carachi also added he hopes to transfuse some new blood into the Sabres' executive and if anyone is interested in a position on the board they should contact him.

Alison also commented on the sale after the meeting saying when he took over as general manager he had three goals in mind. One was to keep major bockey alive in Acton, two was to pay off any debts incurred by the club and thirdly to find a major sponsor for the team.

"All my objectives have been fulfilled," said Allsop, "and I think the team will be in good hands with Mr. Carachi."

According to Carachi the hockey players he has talked to feel, for the most part, the sale will mean new life to the team which so far this year has won only three games.

Carachi concluded his statement saying he is looking forward to running the team and he hopes to fulfill his obligations to the


