It was a battle that saw the lead go back and forth all the way to the finish but in the end Burlington Central managed to edge the local squad out of a place in the finals 51-47. Although the season had to end so sud-

denly, the team held their heads high because of a successful and satisfying season. The team had started their practices on September 9, the second day of school, with
