Novices edged 4-3 in Erin tournament

The Alton McIsaac Novice rep team played their best hockey of the season in the Erin Novice Tournament only to lose a 4-3 overtime thriller to Caledon in the Championship game.
To reach the finals Acton had to defeat Brampton first. Playing a well balanced game the Alton McIsaac team attacked and managed to thrash their opponents 9-0.
Brad Hayter continued his fine season pacing Acton with three goals and three assists. Brad Cripps and Jim Lloyd contributed two goals each and Shane Corkum and Troy MacDougall recorded singles. Assists went to Scott Foster, Jim Katsilieris and Cripps. Ricky Demone played a key role in the game making several tremendous saves for the shut-out.
Game two on Sunday morning saw Acton face Kitchener to a 4-2 win thanks to a great team effort. Acton took a 3-1 lead in the third period with two goals by Hayter and a single by Cripps. However, Kitchener narrowed the gap early in the third period but a re-luxed attack by Hayter clinched the game for Acton. Scott Corbett earned two assists on the plays and Foster and Hayter tallied the other two.

The second win put Acton into the finals against Caledon who had trounced Erin 15-1 and Shelburne 9-0 to reach the finals.
Both teams gave it their best shot, going into overtime to decide the champions. Caledon scored first taking a 1-0 lead into the second period. Hayter then took control of the game scoring three unanswered goals to put Acton ahead 3-1 going into the third period. Hayter was assisted on two of his goals by Katsilieris, Foster and Don Haynes while the rest of the team did their best to keep Caledon off the scoreboard.
A rest between the second and third periods seemed to favor Caledon because early in the third period Acton's opponents rallied with two quick goals to tie the match 3-3.
Both teams then had several great scoring opportunities but outstanding goaltending kept the game tied. Even a break-aways by Hayter was foiled by a hot Caledon goaltender.
At the end of the third period the score remained tied and the game was suddenly into overtime. Unfortunately at the 1:34 mark of the five minute overtime Caledon notched another goal to win the game and the tournament 4-3.
