

Neighborhood Watch meeting January 18

In the first three months after Neighborbood Watch was implemented in many areas of Acton, Halton Regional Police noticed an almost 50 per cent decrease in break and enters, according to crime prevention officer Bob Ustrzycki.

That 50 per cent decrease was followed by five more months of steadily decreasing figures, although exact figures are not available at this time, Ustrzycki said.

Because of this amazing drop in crime, in the eight months the program has been set up, another Neighborhood Watch presentation is planned for next Wednesday, (January 18) at 7.30 p.m. at Acton High School in hopes of further bolstering the program and getting more areas set up, Ustrzycki revealed.

Neighborhood Watch is really just neighbors watching neighbors, the officer explained and reporting to police criminal or suspicious activities that could lead to

In the eight months since the program was originally set up in Acton, police have received many calls from people in Neigh-

borhood Watch, reporting something amiss

in their area. Ustrzycki pointed out volunteers have canvassed door to door explaining the program, and urged people to come out to presentations. The only commitment is showing up for the meeting, the policeman said.


