The American Scandinavian Student Exchange (ASSE) is seeking local families to serve as hosts for 15 Scandinavian, German, Swiss, and British high school students who are part of the ASSE exchange visitor program. The non-profit ASSE is affiliated with the Swedish and Finnish Ministries of Education, according to Canadian director Cindy Boyce.

The students, 16 and 17 years old, are fluent in English and are carefully selected for the program based on their high school performance, good character, and interest in living and studying in Canada.


All students are covered by comprehensive medical and liability insurance and have adequate money for personal needs supplied by their parents. The host family furnishes meals and housing.

The ASSE program offers families the

opportunity to share Canadian cultural and educational experiences with a European young person and, at the same time, to learn about another culture and language. Boyce indicated that a volunteer Area Representative, provided by ASSE, will contact the family and student on a regular basis to assure that everything is going smoothly.

ASSE is also seeking local high school students ested in participating on the ASSE program for an academic year or six week summer holiday in Europe. Students live with a well screened European host family while attending school and learning about the language and people of their chosen country.
