Car Wars III, Retreat of the LTD played before an unenthusiastic crowd at Halton Regional Council last Wednesday and it won't be back for a repeat engagement in 1984.

The debate over Regional Chairman Pete Pomeroy's car, which some councillors have blasted as an embarrassing waste of time, came to a close when council reversed an earlier decision and voted not to lease a Ford LTD, or any other vehicle, for the chairman's use.

Instead, Pomeroy will be given an annual car allowance of \$4,982 from which he is expected to provide for his own transportation needs and expenses.

"I am willing to live with it," said Pomeroy in an interview, adding that he hoped the matter was settled.

Council originally voted December 21 to lease a Ford LTD for Pomeroy at a cost of \$280 a month. But when Pomeroy tried to lease a more expensive Mercury Grand Marquis and pay the additional expense out of his own pocket, a number of councillors balked at the plan.

Led by Halton Hills Councillor Mike Armstrong, they objected to Ford being favoured with the lease without allowing competing dealers to bid on it.

Postpone decision

Ten other videos, which Halton police seized from H and H Video, have been seen by the judge, but not in open court.

Randy Humeniski, of Elena Court and Millie Adams, of Lynden Circle, face two counts of possession of obsence matter for the purpose of circulation. They also face one count of unlawfully circulating obscene matter when they operated H and H Video last May.

Pleas of not guilty have been entered. Bev Boulton, of Park Avenue, was originally charged with unlawfully circulating obscene matter but the charge was dismissed last week after the Crown offered no evidence.

After watching hours of video depictions of sex and violence, a provincial court judge has postponed his decision in an obscene materials trial involving a Georgetown company.

Judge John Robinson set May 8 as the day of judgment for H and H Video. He and the defendants spent much of two days last week watching various sex acts, murders and sex and violence together.

One day was given to the Crown to present three long videos which had been declared obscene in an unrelated trial. The next day, the defence showed exerpts from various other videos.

Armstrong and Burlington Councillor Joan Little both said two weeks ago at an Administration and Finance Committee meeting that they had misunderstood council's original decision, thinking it called for the leasing of a car like an LTD but not specifically an LTD. They also assumed the lease would be put up to bids.

In the face of these objections, Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett suggested at the committee meeting that instead of leasing a car for Pomeroy, the region give him an allowance and let him do what he wanted with it. Armstrong proposed this at the council meeting and it passed with little debate.

Overall, it seems likely the minor controversy will end up having little effect on the original goal of having the regional chairman behind the wheel of a Ford product.

"I am going to lease a car and it will be a Ford product for sure," said Pomeroy in an interview.

Compared to other regions in the area, Halton has chosen to vary from the standard practice of providing for a chairman's transportation needs. Cars are leased and expenses paid for chairmen in the regions of Peel, Waterloo and Hamilton-Wentworth. The regional chairman of Hamilton-Wentworth also gets a chauffeur.

The ladies have been participating in a course put on by the Ministry of Agriculture and Food called "More Cents than


Dollars", where you can use more sense to save dollars in cooking and preparing economical main dishes. Summary day was held in Milton yesterday (Tuesday).
