# Judge grants discharge

A Garden Hill man has been granted an absolute discharge for his part in an incident last March in which an RR 3 Acton woman said she was forced to ride with him from near Port Hope to Acton.  
 County Court Judge Thomas Quinlan granted the discharge to John Wright, who faced a number of weapons charges and one charge of unlawful confinement, all of which sprang from a domestic dispute. Wright was found guilty of possession of a restricted weapon February 3.  
 Wright, a businessman, will not have a criminal record because a conviction is not registered in the case of an absolute discharge.  
 Wright, 55, pleaded not guilty at the beginning of his four day trial to charges that he possessed a restricted weapon; that he possessed a weapon dangerous to the public peace; to using a firearm in the commission of an indictable offence; and to unlawfully confining his common-law wife Dr. Sharon Kopinak and her son Michael during a 1½ hour long drive last March that ended with Halton police on the scene at John's Texaco in Acton.  
 Charges of use of a firearm while committing an indictable offence were dropped early in the trial, after the testimony of Dr. Kopinak, a veterinarian.  
 All charges stemmed from a disagree-

ment between Wright and Dr. Kopinak last March 27 at Wright's Garden Hill home. The court learned Dr. Kopinak and Wright were splitting up and the doctor was moving to RR 3 Acton.  
 Wright learned while on a business trip to Texas that some of his family's furniture might be missing. His common-law wife indicated she would return the goods the next day, but he then discovered she had not brought any of it with her.  
 The court learned Wright became uncharacteristically angry, and assaulted the doctor in front of her son. He tore the telephone from the kitchen wall and twice smashed it to the floor where she lay. He did not hit her with it.  
 The woman contended the furniture had been accidentally taken to Acton and because the door was locked when she was there the previous day, she could not return the furniture.  
 Wright decided the furniture would be returned that day and Dr. Kopinak would return it. He shoved her towards her truck and all three got in for the drive to Acton. Dr. Kopinak drove.  
 Before they left, Wright picked up a brown leatherette bag from his car. Police later found it contained an unloaded .38 cal. revolver, a box of ammunition and some other items.  
 Dr. Kopinak testified that Wright had one hand or the other in the bag for the entire trip, but the court decided that the man had his hand in it only two or three times. Wright told Judge Quinlan he was attempting to retrieve two silver dollars from the bag, which were to be a gift for Michael. Neither the coins, nor the guns were shown, and Wright made no mention of the weapon.  
 When the trio arrived at Dr. Kopinak's new home at RR 3 Acton, they could not get in. At this point Wright decided they would return to Port Hope, and Dr. Kopinak drove to the gas station. When stopped here, the vet testified, Wright left her and the boy alone in the truck while he refueled. She and Michael quickly and quietly escaped the truck and asked the service station attendant to call the police.  
 Judge Quinlan described the couple's relationship as "stormy." He said he found Mrs. Kopinak to be a "woman of strong will, candid in her evidence, and capable of saying anything when she is angry." He described her as a "tempestuous woman." Wright on the other hand, is the opposite—quiet, staid and conservative. Wright could be described as a person one would have to put a bomb under to move, said the judge.  
 In part of his judgement, the judge indicated Dr. Kopinak went on the trip to Acton "with some reservations or reluctance. She was probably so taken aback by his uncharacteristic determination that she agreed to go," Judge Quinlan pointed out.

# Obituary

## Millicent Waldie

Millicent Waldie died on Monday, January 23, in the Toronto Wellesley Hospital.  
 Born in Londonderry, Ireland, she came to Canada in 1919, settling in Saskatchewan with her family. Later she came to Toronto and attended the Deaconess Training School, new Ewart College, and became a Deaconess.  
 In 1935, she married Rev. John R. Waldie, a Presbyterian minister, who was born south of Acton, and received his education at Dublin School and Acton High School. Some relatives of his still live in the district.  
 As a deaconess and a minister's wife, Mrs. Waldie spent her life ministering to the needs of others, while they served in congregations in Arthur, London, Port Arthur, Westminster and Toronto Presbyterian churches. She was especially interested in the work of the Women's Missionary Society, Canadian Children's Work, and the Canadian Girls in Training, wherever they served.  
 Her husband predeceased her in 1974, and she is survived by a daughter, Kathleen of Toronto, son, Donald, of Hamilton and a brother-in-law, Alex Waldie of Acton.  
 The funeral service was held in Toronto, with burial in Fairview Cemetery.
