## Play difficult — Globe does well

Georgetown Globe Productions' presentation of New Girl in Town was adjudicated on Saturday evening, February 11, by John Plank, the artistic director of the Arbor Theatre in Peterborough, on behalf of the Association of Community Theatres-Central Ontario (ACT-CO). New Girl in Town is one of 13 musical plays being adjudicated by Mr. Plank and awards in various facets of theatre will be announced at the Theatre Arts Ball to be held at the Harbour Castle Hotel, Toronto, on April 7 next.

Plank started by congratulating the Town of Halton Hills on having such a beautiful theatre, saying that many larger centres do not have such excellent facilities.

He commented that New Girl in Town is seldom performed play, lacking well-known songs and with a faulty "book", which makes characterizations difficult. It was to Globe's credit that they made such a good job of it and offered the opinion that the group had the makings of a great company, with a tremendous amount of talent and energy. He sensed a rare relationship between the performers and their audience.

The adjudicator stated, Globe's most obvious strengths were in its choral work and in its beautiful backdrops, both of which won them THEA awards last year. The chorus, directed by Terry Champ, was a highlight of the show. The backdrops, executed by Linda Roe, Ray Feasey and John Minns, were extraordinary, Plank said. He thought that the carpentry work on the sets did not match them in excellence, although he complimented Gerry Andrew on the overall design.

After discussing costumes, which he felt were a little too clean and "spiffy" for the denizens of the seedy district of New York City which the cast portrayed, he moved to the subject of lighting, which was designed by Tom Johnson. Plank felt that he had done an excellent job and gave-some pointers on

how he thought it could be improved.

The orchestra, directed by Terry Champ, was described as "promising" and supported the play very well, though needing a little more lightness and lyricism.

Plank then commented on the performances of the four lead actors in the play: Anna, played by Dianne Ticknor, was successful in a very difficult role, while Matt, played by Joe Del Guidice, was "super", with lots of energy and "electricity". Don Baldwin playing the part of Chris, has a beautiful voice and did a terrific job with what is also a difficult role, while Marie Cleaton as "Marthy" has an excellent sense of timing and comedy.

Director Sandy Macdonald handled the crowd scenes well the the adjudicator added, although at times they did not look natural and it sometimes appeared that the chorus was just "hanging around". He generally felt that Macdonald and the choreographer, Phyllis de Rosa Koetting were to be congratulated on the way they got so much energy and enthusiasm out of the cast. He also congratulated stage managers Jack Ferguson and Alan Wells on their fine work.



Appeal deadline—March 7, 1984

The Assessment Review Board is an impartial body reporting to the Attorney General of Ontario, which provides you with an additional opportunity to have your assessment reviewed if, in your opinion, it is not fair and equitable with similar properties in your area. The Review Board is more informal and relaxed than a regular court of law. You may present your own case, retain a lawyer or ask a relative or friend to speak as your agent.

To help you in filing your appeal, Notice of Appeal forms are available from the Assessment Review Board, your Regional Assessment Office or your Municipal Office. As well, you can use the reverse side of a Notice of Assessment or write a letter stating the property address and roll number, together with your reasons for appealing. Appeals should be forwarded to the Regional Registrar of the Assessment Review Board listed below.
