Up to towns to promote own tourism, says official

It's up to the individual areas throughout Ontario to pick up on the provincial 'Yours to Discover' tourism campaign.

Colin Chedore, marketing manager for the Ontario Ministry of Tourism; told about 100 Acton Chamber of Commerce members Monday night the main job of the Ministry was to make people aware of tourism in this province, but it was up to areas such as Acton to make tourists know what it avallable on a local level.

Chedore told the members about Ontario's marketing campaign, which since 1979 has turned the image of Ontario around and increased the inflow of tourists from the United States by 1.5 per cent.

David Bingham, Tourism-Industrial Consultant for the Ministry, was also on hand for the annual general meeting. He revealed Halton has applied for a study program to assess the needs and weaknesses of the area as far as tourism is concerned. This study is a jointly-funded project by the Ministry, local and regional governments and the private sector.

Bingham noted the Ministry campaign creates a climate to encourage people to come to Ontario, or for Ontario residents to stay in the province. Then, he said, it is up the local areas to give the tourists something to do.

The consultant showed a film explaining the benefits on the local economy tourism is developed from the hotel owner right down to the farmer providing the food. Almost 12 per cent of Ontario's gross

product is generated from tourism, the film stated, with 13 per cent of all jobs stemming from the trade. Chamber president Steve Dawkins warned the private sector was going to have

to work with the government which "can be a very pleasant surprise." Regional chairman Pete Pomeroy told the Chamber members he recently returned from Yugoslavia and the Olympics. While there he learned the small, poor country held the international games mainly to attract tourists, not just this month, but in

the future. The entire world got to see how beautiful the country is and hopefully will vacation there.

Pomeroy encouraged everyone to speak to their councillors about the proposed tourism study to get it passed through regional

He labelled the revitalization of the Acton Chamber of Commerce as a success story and siad he encourages and supports tourism.

Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller said he has spoken to a lot of business people in North Halton and found them to be very enthusiastic. "That's the only way we are going to flourish." Miller pointed out this area has a lot to offer tourists.

red Managua aluminum canoe.



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
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
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
