Mintern named courier of Seagram's award

John Mintern of the Acton Curling Club has been awarded the Seagram's Five Star Achievement Award.

The award was initiated by Seagram's to acknowledge those people who have done an outstanding service to both the game of curling and their individual curling clubs.

Mintern, 62, said he was quite pleased and surprised that he was chosen to receive the award.

"I know a lot of people who do a lot for curling in this area and I'm honored to be awarded with this," remarked Mintern.

Mintern, who has been curling for 24 years, has been instrumental in setting up curling bonspiels and running the club's social functions for many, many years.

He and his wife, Alice, have also been presidents of their respective leagues in the North Halton Curling Club and Mintern and a Brampton man, Charlie Royce, started one of Halton's biggest tournaments, the Halton-Peel Bonspiel.

Mintern and his wife were avid golfers when they came to Georgetown in 1960 from Oshawa. While golfing, at the North Halton Golf and Country Club they made several lasting friends who suggested that when the golf season ended why not take up curling.

Mintern and his wife accepted the advice and for the next few curling seasons they became more and more involved in the sport.

From 1960 until the spring of 1966 Mintern and his wife headed various social events and draws and then in the fall of 1966 Mintern became president of the Men's league and his wife became president of the women's league.

During Mintern's term, as president he and Royce, the Brampton Curling Club President, started the Smith and Stone Bonspiel which has been renamed the Halton-Peel Bonspiel. What started out as

a 48 rink event with \$600 in prizes in 1968 has become a 100 rink tournament with over \$3,000 in prizes," said Mintern. The Halton-Peel Spiel is the biggest curling event in the area now and every year it continues to grow and thrive.

Mintern remained president until 1969 when he moved back to the Toronto area. For two years he curled at the Avonlea Curling Club and then, for one year he curled at the Tamheather Curling Club.

In March 1974 Mintern returned to the area, this time settling just north of Acton on Highway 25. He started curling in Acton and in 1977 joined the Ontario Curling Association (OCA).

"I still try and encourage people to come out and start curling," said Mintern.

"It's a lot of fun, good exercise and most importantly everyone can make a lot of friends."

Currently Mintern is playing the sport a couple of times a week and is usually on hand at the local club to lend a helping hand.

For the future Mintern said he'll likely continue to curl and he hopes to talk more and more people into joining in on what has been a terrific part of his life.
