Meanderings

A colorful St. Patrick's Day dessert is the chocolate lime swirl that many people make. Butter a deep 9 in. glass pie plate or square pyrex dish. Line the sides with chocolate wafers and crush about 20 wafers with 3 tablespoons of melted butter and press them in the bottom reserving a few for the top. Put one tall can of Carnation milk in the freezer in a flat pan until it forms ice crystals. Put a half cup boiling water in a package of lime Jello. Add one teaspoon of grated lemon rind and a few drops of green coloring. Let this stand while whipping the milk to a stiff froth. Add the jelly to the whipped milk and continue whipping until stiff. Pour over the crumbs and sprinkle the remaining crumbs on top. Chill overnight.
