



At the same time, producers for Newman's movie approached the British firm of Thunder and Colt balloon manufacturers, requesting the name of someone who could pilot a balloon for the movie. Al is a director and co-owner of the company and just happened to be in Switzerland at the

right time. Al explains that in the movie, Newman is making a great escape in a balloon, over the Alps. Newman jumps into the basket and off they go.

Unfortunately Newman never showed up for the segment Al was involved in, and a stand-in was used instead. Al himself is never seen on camera, but his balloon is. The balloon takes off and heads toward

Italy. Meanwhile, an airplane loaded with

movie equipment was filming the 135 kilometre trek, as well as cameras positioned throughout the mountain. It took about a week to get off the ground, Al says, Inclement weather forced postponment of the trip. In the meantime, Al gave

seminars and demonstrations to tourists, and flew an airship, which is not too unlike a

blimp. There was a lot of preparation for the flight. Al recalls. Three days' food supply was taken aboard, survival gear, two radios and oxygen. The temperature was about zero degrees fahrenheit. He also had to have Italian money with him as well as his passport and other papers.

Flying at 14,000 feet about sea level, the balloon edged over the mountain peaks with 1,500 to 2,000 feet to spare. At one point he could see the Matterborn in the distance.
