Tillsonburg tops after tangle with Acton

Despite an outstanding effort by the Nellis Construction Major Atoms the Tillsonburg Atoms managed a 2-0 victory to take the Centennial Atom Tournament for the third year in a row.

The 10th annual tournament started last Friday night and concluded with clean, fast paced hockey that entertained fans and parents for the duration of each match.

Acton entered two teams in the competition against 14 out-of-town-teams from Kitchener, Dundas, Mississauga, Waterloo, Glanbrook, Oshawa, Oakridge, Ancaster, Leamington, Tillsonburg and Ayr.

The Kitchener Panthers opened the tournament with a 5-4 loss to Dundas Friday night and then Mississauga blanked the Acton Glenlea Drugs Minor Atoms squad 6-0. The Kitchener Mets wrapped up day one of the tournament blasting Waterloo 3-0. The Acton Major Atoms were on the ice at 7 a.m. Saturday morning to take their first win of the tourney 2-1 against the Mississauga Navajos, then the Oshawa Blackhawka streaked to a 3-1 win over Glanbrook. Oakridge then defeated the Ancaster Royals 4-1, the Oshawa Redwings edged Learnington 4-3 and round one ended with Tillsonburg blowing out Ayr 10-1.

The Kitchener Panthers opened round two striking for six unanswered goals to blank the Acton Minors and Dundas continued their winning streak against the Mississauga Algonquins with a 4-3 win. Round two continued with the Mississauga Navajos nipping Waterloo 3-1, the Acton majors defeating the Kitchener Mets 3-0, Ancaster bombing Glanbrook 5-2, the Oshawa Blackhawks nlpping Oakridge 4-3, Leemington thumping Ayr 7-1, Tillsonburg

dumping the Oshawa Redwings 6-0, the Mississauga Navajos slipping by the Kitchener Panthers 2-1, the Acton Majors upsetting Dundas 5-2 , Leemington overpowering Ancaster 5-3 and Tillsonburg wrapping up the qualifying rounds with a 5-0 win over the Oshawa Blackhawks.

The end results saw the Mississauga Navajos pitted against Leemington for the consolation award and the Atom Majors matched with Tillsonburg for top honors.

In the consolation final Mississauga played a hard fought but clean match to come out on top with a 2-1 win and in the championship match the score remained 1-0 until the final three minutes of the match when a drive by Tillsonburg final rewarded them with the game clinching goal. Tillsonburg's win has given them their third consecutive win in the Centennial Tournament.

The Tournament Chairman Bill Knight described the tournament as a huge success and, with only one team really blown out of the competition, nearly every game was a thriller.

"Nearly 80 per cent of the people on the organization committee has been with us for 10 years," commented Knight, "and each

year things run all that more smoothly." There were only two injuries in the tournament said Knight and fortunately

they weren't too serious.

Planning for next year's tournament will begin in a few months said Knight and everyone involved is looking forward to another three days of competition.

"All the coaches, parents and players had a really good time and everyone behaved themselves," concluded Knight.


