11 named to Hall of Fame

The Ontario Agricultural Hall of Fame Association has announced the names of 11 outstanding agriculturalists who will be admitted to the Hall of Fame Gallery at the Ontario Agricultural Museum on Sunday, June 10th, 1984.

The candidates, all deceased, will be honored in a special ceremony, and their likenesses unveiled for public viewing. They will join 37 persons who have been honoured previously.

The eleven candidates to be honored on June 10th include:

Will Barrie (Cambridge)—1884-1962—Plowman; seed grower; conservationist; leader in agricultural societies; and early farm associations. Will Barrie established high standards for his family and every organization in which he was involved.

Charles Boynton (Markham Township)—1891-1970—Breeder and exhibitor of top quality swine; livestock judge; Director of the Canadian National Exhibition; Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and local Agricultural Societies.

E. Egerton Harris Q.C. (St. Catharines)—1906-1982—Recognized as the foremost legal authority on "Marketing Board Legislation" in Ontario, he drafted and defended most marketing plans.

Ethel Brant Monture (Brant County) 1894-1977—Leader in Agricultural Societies; Women's Institute activities; historian; writer and humanitarian, Mrs. Monture influenced the course of many lives.

John McIntosh (Dundela)—1777-1845—The apple that bears his name has become the most famous variety in the world market. John McIntosh and his family propagated and distributed this important Ontario variety.

Watson Porter (London)—1836-1957—A

leader in the field of soil and water conservation, he was Editor in Chief of the "Farmers Advocate" for 27 years, and a major influence on agricultural practices in Ontario.

Professor George Raithby (Guelph)—1901-1981—As Professor of Animal Husbandry at the Ontario Agricultural College, he influenced the development of Ontario's livestock industry beyond measure, as a teacher, researcher, judge and classifier.

M. M. "Bobby" Robinson (Burlington)—1888-1974—As Secretary-Manager of the Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association and Editor of the "GROWER" he provided outstanding leadership in the marketing of these products.

William Weld (London)—1824-1891—Editor and Publisher of the "Farmers Advocate", established Weldwood Farm, and was a leader in the establishment of the Ontario Agricultural College, the Royal Winter Fair and the Canadian Livestock Breeders Association.

Dr. Charles A. Zavitz (Guelph)—1863-1942—As Director of the Field Husbandry Department at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, he is best remembered for his work in cereal grain development and his influence on the industry in his writings.

The Ontario Agricultural Hall of Fame Gallery is one of the major attractions at the Ontario Agricultural Museum in Milton, and is available for public viewing seven days a week from mid-May until Thanksgiving weekend.
