

**Armstrong**

"I hope I'm not showing my party colors", commented Councillor Mike Armstrong as he branded as propaganda a letter from Liberal MPP Herb Epp.

The letter to the Town clerk, and included on Council's agenda, criticized the PC government on unconditional grants, and road subsidies.

Armstrong said he respected Epps, but did not think municipal councils should be a forum for the discussion. He urged such matters be dealt with directly by the Minister and council, or through the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.

After speaking for ten minutes on the subject, Armstrong commented, "It doesn't even deserve discussion".

## Lot levies hit \$4,489

Lot levies are going up again. They are tied to the Southam Construction Index and this year are going up 3.6 per cent.

Anyone building a house, before turning the sod, will pay \$2,029 to the Town plus \$2,460 to the Region, for a total of \$4,489.

In building semi-detached, duplex or triplex dwellings the same amount will be paid for each unit.

For each fourplex, townhouse, or apartment under three storeys, the builder will pay \$2,133 to the Town and \$2,262 to the Region for a total of \$4,395 per unit.

For apartment buildings over three storeys, the lot levy charge is \$1,443 to the Town and \$2,262 to the Region, for a total of \$3,705 per unit.

The levy per unit in senior citizens' apartments is \$961 to the Town and \$972 to the Region.

## Town pays \$50 for tree

Halton Hills is paying \$50 to have one tree planted in the south while it's receiving a new tree free of charge for Remembrance Park in Georgetown.

Monday night councillors approved a list of 15 projects and events to be funded this Ontario Bicentennial year.

At the same meeting they learned Grand River Conservation Authority is giving the Town a free eight foot white pine.

Among the Bicentennial projects funded is \$50 for Mayor Russ Miller to plant a tree at the Royal Botanical Gardens (RBG).

Councillor Dave Whiting argued that when the region's giving the RBG nearly \$200,000 this year, something he isn't too pleased about, the least they could do is donate the trees the mayor's of each of Halton's municipalities will plant.

If the money was taken out Halton Hills would wind up being the only municipality without a tree at the RBG.

Whiting suggested the mayor plant the free tree from the conservation authority. However, when it came to a vote Whiting's view lost badly.

The conservation authority will not only give the Town the tree as a Bicentennial gift, but will also plant it free of charge in any location the Town picked. Staff suggested Remembrance Park and council agreed.

In all the Town is spending \$10,000 from Queen's Park on the Bicentennial as well as another \$2,500 of its own money.

Following is the list of organizations and the projects their grant from the Town will help fund:

1. Glen Williams Town Hall; \$750; an old

fashioned homecoming.

2. Esquesing Historical Society; \$200; an essay writing contest on various topics for young and old alike.

3. Georgetown Chamber of Commerce; \$1,500; the BIG celebration in June.

4. Georgetown Optimist Club; \$4,000; bringing the RCMP Musical Ride and a band from Georgetown, Kentucky, to town.

5. Halton Hills Libraries; \$200; a trivia contest and guest speakers.

6. Limehouse Women's Institute; \$100; outdoor church service and pioneer day.

7. Speyside Highland Games; \$500; bringing the Fraser Highlanders to the event.

8. Recreation department; \$750; special Bicentennial medallions for honors and recognition awards night.

9. Royal Botanical Gardens; \$50.

10. Acton Chamber of Commerce; \$1,500; for Leathertown Market and Ciderfest weekend at the end of August.

11. New Year's Eve Bicentennial celebrations in Acton and Georgetown (already spent) \$1000.

12. Town Bicentennial buttons; \$200; a couple of thousand buttons to be given away during the year.

13. CNE, August 16; \$300; expenses to cover transporting performers and entertainers from Halton Hills so they can put on a show from 1 to 5 p.m. at the CNE bandshell on August 16.

14. A Town Flag; \$450.

15. Bicentennial year end advertisements; \$1,000; a leaflet or ads in local papers celebrating the soon ending Bicentennial and Acton and Georgetown's milestone years.

RECONSTRUCTION OF STEELES AVENUE (REGIONAL ROAD NO. 8) FROM 9th LINE TO WINSTON CHURCHILL BOULEVARD

Notice is hereby given pursuant to Section 301 of the Ontario Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 302 as amended, that the Council for the Regional Municipality of Halton proposes at its meeting on May 23, 1984, at 1:30 p.m. to pass a by-law for construction work on Steeles Avenue and Winston Churchill Boulevard within the following limits:

- 1) Reconstruction of Steeles Avenue from approximately 80 m west of 10th Line North to approximately 40 m west of Winston Churchill Boulevard.
- 2) Intersection improvements and widening at Steeles Avenue and Winston Churchill Boulevard within the following limits:
  - (a) On Steeles Avenue from Winston Churchill Boulevard to approximately 280 m east of Winston Churchill Boulevard.
  - (b) on Winston Churchill Boulevard from approximately 120 m north of Steeles Avenue to approximately 80 m south of Steeles Avenue.
  - (c) asphalt overlay and drainage improvements on Steeles Avenue from 20 m west of 9th Line south to 80 m west of 10th Line north.

The intersection improvements at Steeles Avenue and Winston Churchill Boulevard will include left turn lanes on Steeles Avenue and Winston Churchill Boulevard. Curb and gutter drainage will be provided within the limits of the intersection.

The remainder of Steeles Avenue will be constructed to rural standards with roadside ditch drainage.

Plans showing the proposed work may be inspected at the Public Works Department offices, 2316 South Service Road West, Oakville, Ontario, or the North District Operations Centre, 1600 Steeles Avenue West, Milton, during normal business hours.

On May 16, 1984, at 9:30 a.m. in Committee Room No. 1 at the Regional Administration Building, 1151 Bronte Road, Oakville, Ontario, Council through its Planning and Public Works Committee will hear in person, or by his Counsel, any person who claims that his lands will be prejudicially affected by the said by-law and who applies to be heard to the Regional Clerk, no later than May 11, 1984 at 4:30 p.m.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

#### Butterscotch Brownies

Preheat Oven to 350 degrees F.

- ¼c. Butter
- 1 c. Brown Sugar
- 1 Egg
- 1 tsp. Vanilla
- ½ c. All Purpose Flour
- 1½ tsp. Baking Powder
- ½ tsp. Salt
- ½-1 c. Walnuts

— Melt butter in a saucepan and stir the sugar into it until melted. Cool slightly, then beat in egg and vanilla thoroughly.

— Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Stir into the butter mixture, then add nuts.

— Pour batter into 9"x9" pan (greased) and bake 20-25 mins. Cut into bars when fully cooled.
