Lot levies hit \$4,489

Lot levies are going up again. They are tied to the Southam Construction Index and this year are going up 3.6 per cent.

Anyone building a house, before turning the sod, will pay \$2,029 to the Town plus \$2,460 to the Region, for a total of \$4,489.

In building semi-detached, duplex or triplex dwellings the same amount will be paid for each unit.

For each fourplex, townhouse, or apartment under three storeys, the builder will pay \$2,133 to the Town and \$2,262 to the Region for a total of \$4,395 per unit.

For apartment buildings over three storeys, the lot levy charge is \$1,443 to the Town and \$2,262 to the Region, for a total of \$3,705 per unit.

Town pays \$50 for tree

Halton Hills is paying \$50 to have one tree planted in the south while it's receiving a new tree free of charge for Remembrance Park in Georgetown.

Whiting suggested the mayor plant the free tree from the conservation authority. However, when it came to a vote Whiting's view lost badly.

The conservation authority will not only give the Town the tree as a Bicentennial gift, but will also plant it free of charge in any location the Town picked. Staff suggested Remembrance Park and council
