On site billing will save cash

Halton Hills Hydro commission will investigate on site billing.

The fairly new billing system is currently in use in Markham, and results in substantial financial savings to the commission according to chairman Murt Allison.

At the commission's monthly meeting Friday, Allison sought permission for fellow commissioner Doug Mason and himself to look into the system, which costs about 80 cents a bill, compared to the current \$1.50 a bill system.

Vice-chairman Ab Tennant explained the system involves only the metre reader, who, with a hand-held computer punches in the numbers on the computer which calculates the bill. A porta printer instantly prints up the bill and the employee can leave the bill in the mail box, thus eliminating mailing the information to the customer, and saving time.

Commissioners were enthusiastic about the new system. Tennant pointed out the commission looked into the system some time ago when it was brand new, but decided because of the problems other areas were having with it, they would wait. Now, he said, the "bugs have been ironed out" and it is a proven system. He noted he is glad they waited, saying other commissions spent the money to improve it, and now all Halton Hills has to do is by the system.

Allison said he and Mason would go and talk to the Markham commission and find out all the details and report back to the local group at the next meeting.

Hydro vehicles will be painted

Bestway Auto Body and Lorne's Auto Body have been awarded contracts to paint seven vehicles belonging to Halton Hills Hydro, for a total price of \$5054.68.

Bestway won the bid for six of the seven for a total cost of \$4033.90, but did not bid on the larger five ton dump truck. Lorne's Auto Body had the lowest bid of \$1020.78 for this vehicle and beat out seven other firms.

Commission general manager Jerry Trudell noted \$5,000 had been budgetted for the painting of two large trucks, but it was decided to do several vehicles. In the end, noted vice-chairman Ab Tennant, all the vehicles are being done for only \$54 over budget.

Police offer info reward

The Halton regional police board of governors is offering \$10,000 for information leading to the arrest of those responsible for the murder of a 27-year-old Oakville woman last September.

Police urge area residents with any information about the crime to call 878-5511. Their identity will be kept strictly confidential.

Delia Adriano was dropped off at her Oakville home last Sept. 26 at 9:30 p.m. and was seen walking toward the side entrance. Almost an hour later, a woman's screams were heard nearby and a woman fitting Adriano's description was seen being forced into a dark compact car. There was a struggle inside the car before it left with its driving lights off. Adriano's purse was later discovered at the scene.

Adriano's nude body was found Nov. 6 in a wooded lot in rural Milton.

EFW reserve established

Regional council has committed taxpayers supporting energy from waste as a garbage disposal option in Halton.

On Wednesday Council agreed to set up an EFW Reserve Fund with a special 3 per cent mill rate levy that will collect \$450,660 from taxpayers in 1984.

Council also agreed to transfer \$250,000 of unallocated regional reserves to the fund.

The money is intended to finance the building of an Energy From Waste garbage incinerator in Halton to handle up to 75 per cent of the garbage generated in the region.

There are six business and four Hydro transformer stations in Halton that are being examined by regional consultants to determine if they would be suitable for the location of an EFW plant nearby which will provide steam for electricity.

Starting in 1985 a charge of \$4 will be added to tipping fees at any regional landfill site to go into the EFW reserve.
