Next time the relatives act like Little

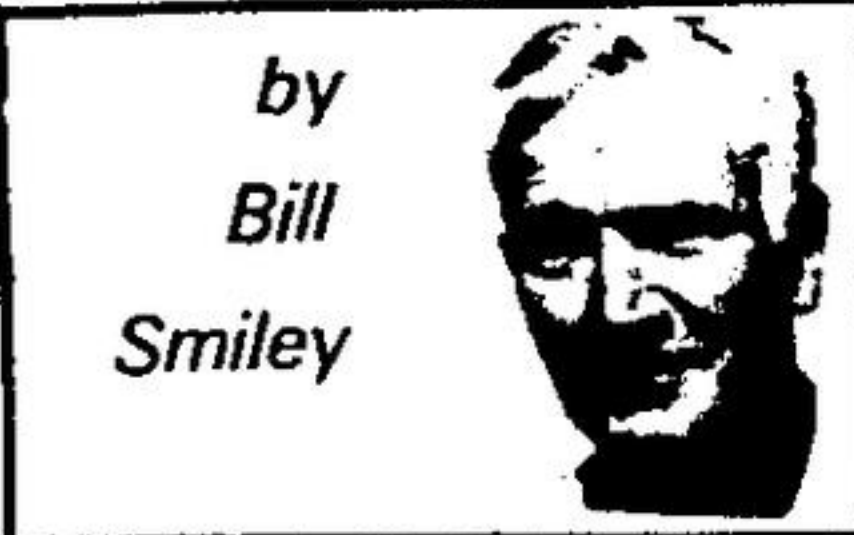
