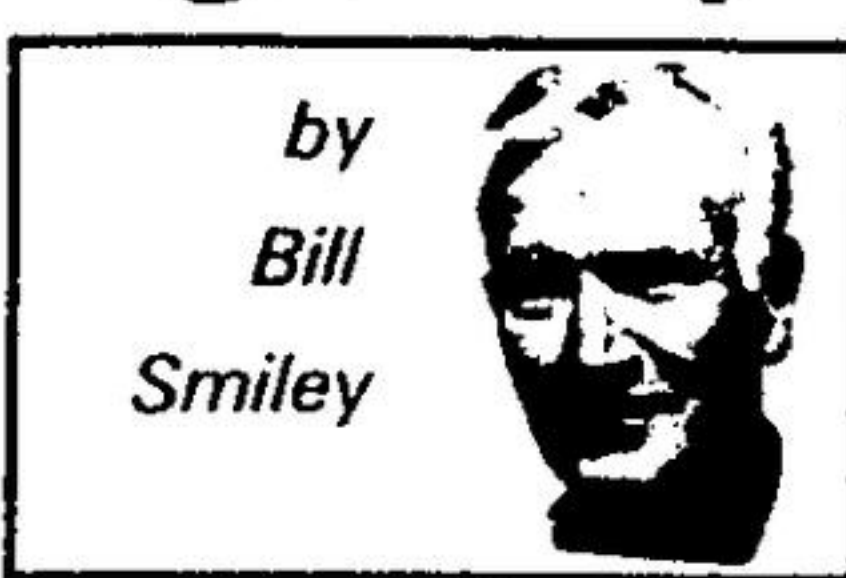

You'd think a big, important chap like that wouldn't have time to bother with a small-town editor. Not him. And he's going to pay me back that \$25 he borrowed just as soon as he gets that big Broadway role. He even gave me his autograph, without me having to ask. That's the sort of real, lasting friendships you build in college.
