RECIPE OF THE WEEK

HONEY DATE LOAF CAKE

- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1 1/2 cups sifted soft whole wheat flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk
- 1 cup chopped dates
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts or sunflower seeds

Cream shortening. Gradually beat in honey. Add egg, lemon rind and juice. Beat thoroughly.

Sift dry ingredients, and add alternately with sour milk, to egg mixture. Add dates and nuts.

Pour into greased pan (9 x 4 inches). Bake in preheated oven at 350°F for 50-60 minutes or until a skewer inserted in center comes out clean.

NOTE: This cake is moist inside.
