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# Region traffic bylaw six years in making

With a minimum of discussion, Halton's planning and public works committee last week ended six years of administrative work by approving the region's new uniform traffic bylaw.

The 117-page document, awaiting council's final approval next Wednesday (May 9), standardizes wording, section numbering, schedule lettering and even titles and column sizes for all four area municipalities so that police and bylaw enforcement officers can better enforce and prosecute its provisions.

Oakville Councillor Fred Oliver, a member of the Halton Police Commission, wanted to make sure last week that police are satisfied with the new bylaw, known as 1-84. Regional solicitor Ken Anderson was ready with verbal assurance but agreed to get police endorsement in writing before next week's meeting.

Anderson's report on the new bylaw indicates that the actual content of sections

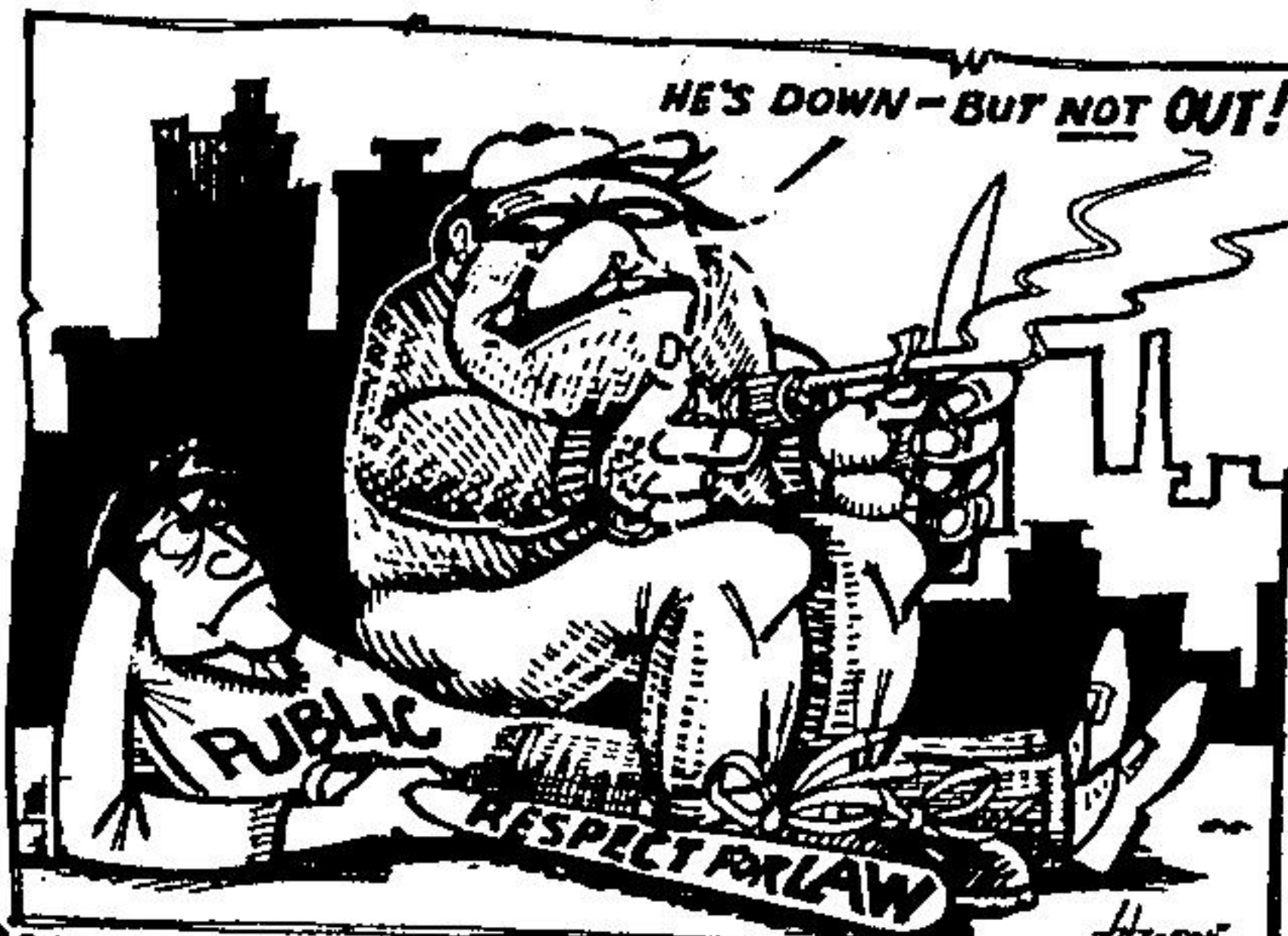
pertaining specifically to area municipalities is left to the area councils.

"Each area municipality will now be required to pass its own bylaw in the form of 1-84 and complete its own set of schedules," he said. "Minor changes may be needed to tailor the bylaw to each individual municipality before passage by the respective councils."

As well as general regulations for the operation of vehicles, pedestrian rights and bicycling, the new bylaw covers parking and stopping restrictions, meter parking, traffic movement, speed regulations, limited loads, offences and penalties and administration.

### RESPECT FOR LAW

"RESPECT FOR LAW WEEK" is an annual observance sponsored by the Optimist Club of Georgetown and has been proclaimed by Mayor Russ Miller of the Town of Halton Hills that the dates of this observance May 6 to 12 were selected to focus upon the related year-round activities of the 135,000 voluntary service organization.

problems of crime. Since that time Optimist Clubs and other civic groups throughout the United States and Canada have become actively involved in programs and projects to combat disrespect for law and public apathy toward crime.

The Optimists are quick to point out their program does not reflect a blanket enforcement of the practices and personnel of all law enforcement agencies but does emphasize the need for citizens to demand good law enforcement and to offer cooperation in every possible way.

Optimist Dan Martin, President of the Georgetown Optimist Club has stated the club will be observing "RESPECT FOR LAW WEEK" in the following ways: To recognize and award citizens and police officers of this community for their involvement in the reducing of crime.

President Dan asks all citizens to join with the Optimist Club of Georgetown in this observance. "Good Law Enforcement" cannot be the sole responsibility of Police Officers alone. "YOUR HELP IS NEEDED."

## Bateman art here June 1

An exhibition of paintings by the renowned Canadian wildlife artist, Robert Bateman will be held at the Halton Hills Library and Cultural Centre.

The opening June 1 of the collection entitled "Robert Bateman—The Early Years", is expected to attract the largest crowd the gallery has seen since its opening, as visitors from near and far come to see the unique collection mounted by John Sommer of Gallery House Sol.

Naturalist, author, lecturer, world traveler and teacher, the work of the renowned Canadian artist has been widely acclaimed in recent years. He has received many honours, among them he was made an Officer of the Order of Canada this week.

Among the sketches and paintings to be exhibited locally will be landscapes painted during Bateman's teenage years, some favourite abstract expressionist paintings, and various other works including sketches and sculpture from his private collection.

Best known for his wildlife realism, set in their natural surroundings, the artist's work was commissioned as a wedding gift for Prince Charles and Diana, Princess of Wales and hangs in collections in Monaco, England, the United States, several provinces and numerous private collections.
