### Tips from the

## Golf Doctor



of Halton Hills

#### SET UP

"The most important requirement to an effective and sound golf swing."

The set up comprises the following procedures—1. Club face alignment. 2. Grip. 3. Ball position. 4. Stance. 5. Posture position.

These are the prerequisites needed to establish an effective and repetitive movement of the golf club.

In today's article I'm going to discuss the first of the five prerequisites, club face alignment. In order for the ball to travel to its target the club head must be heading in that direction. To make that happens the club face should be aligned at the target.

Your procedure is as follows: First stand behind the ball in a position so that the ball is directly between you and the target. Attempt to pick a spot—a leaf, piece of grass etc.—between the ball and the target. Once that spot has been decided on, place the face of the golf club aiming at that spot—one thing we do know, neither the ball or the target will move, therefore we can now concentrate on the spot which has been picked. When making a two foot putt, you first place the putter behind the ball, aiming the putter at the hole, we do the same to hit a shot 250 yards down the fairway; we aim the golf club first, the body second. (The body is set parallel to the target not at the target.)

When you are out practicing make sure that the club face is aligned first. Without that first step the others mean nothing. Practice with a purpose and practice only one area at a time. If you find your mind wandering, get it back on track.

As the best in the world say "Be a mind beater not a ball beater."
