



## Region yields

A strip of land across a Victoria St. homeowner's yard has become private property again after spending 36 years in public control.

Halton regional council last week quitclaimed an easement first granted to the then-village of Acton in 1948 for sewers. drains, watermains and wiring conduits.

A 150-millimetre watermain was constructed there in the late '40s but abandoned in 1976 when the Mill St. watermain was extended.

Since the region has no further need for the easement, the public works department recommended it should quit-claim the property as requested by Peiter Van der Eyken, current owner of 4 and 6 Victoria Sts.
