

Eramosa Council

Appoint Inspector

On the recommendation of Fire Chief Carl Meadows Eramosa Township Council selected Thomas Rockola as the township's fire inspector as required by new regulations from the Ontario Fire Marshall. The chief submitted several names from the Volunteer Fire Department for the job and council picked Mr. Rockola. Wages per hour are to be set at a future meeting with 30 cents per mile for travel.

The fire chief advised council at their May 7 meeting that he and the former reeve had initiated an emergency measures scheme but it had been abandoned when it was decided there would be a county-wide plan.

Proposes seven lots

Council advised Don Tomlinson they would like him to make a formal application of his proposal to create seven lots on his property on the south side of 5 Sideroad. Creation of the lots would require an amendment to the Official Plan and the Zoning Bylaw.

Discuss sale of lots

Rockwood village trustees met with township council to discuss general business and the 1984 budget at the May 7 meeting. Discussions also included the village deficit and road conditions. The possibility of selling the lot next to the fire hall to the township to provide parking for firefighters, the medical centre and Squire's Lodge was considered as well as the sale of a lot on the corner of Gower and Dowler Streets. No decisions were made.

Advertise for grader

Council authorized road superintendent Bob Hamilton to advertise for a new road grader to meet the Township's specifications. Tenders must be in the hands of the clerk by 12 noon on Monday, June 4. Mr. Hamilton also reviewed letters to the Ministry of Transportation and MPP Jack Johnson about a turning lane on 24 Highway at Bruceedale.

Authorize security

Building Inspector John Salmon and council discussed the excavation of rock at Rockmosa Park addition as well as a security system for the medical centre. Council authorized both expenditures.

Tax increase \$36 in twp., \$45 in village

Taxes for the average homeowner will increase \$36 in Eramosa Township and \$45.89 in Rockwood.

The Eramosa Town Council voted in favor of the increase last week.

Based on an average assessed home of \$3,000 in Rockwood the \$45.89 increase is a 4.9 per cent jump. The \$36 increase in Eramosa Township based on an average assessed home of \$3,000 constitutes a 3.8 per cent hike.

Revenue last year totaled \$1,772,911. This year the total revenue required is \$1,874,408. The school board will receive 60 per cent of tax revenues, the county will receive 15 per cent, and the remaining 25 per cent will be spent locally.

Accept tenders

Council accepted the quote from Miller Paving to supply and apply calcium to township roads at a price of \$183.85 per flake equivalent ton. The tender of Mann Construction, Guelph, to crush and deliver 25,000 cubic yards of crushed gravel at \$2.43 per cubic yard was also accepted.

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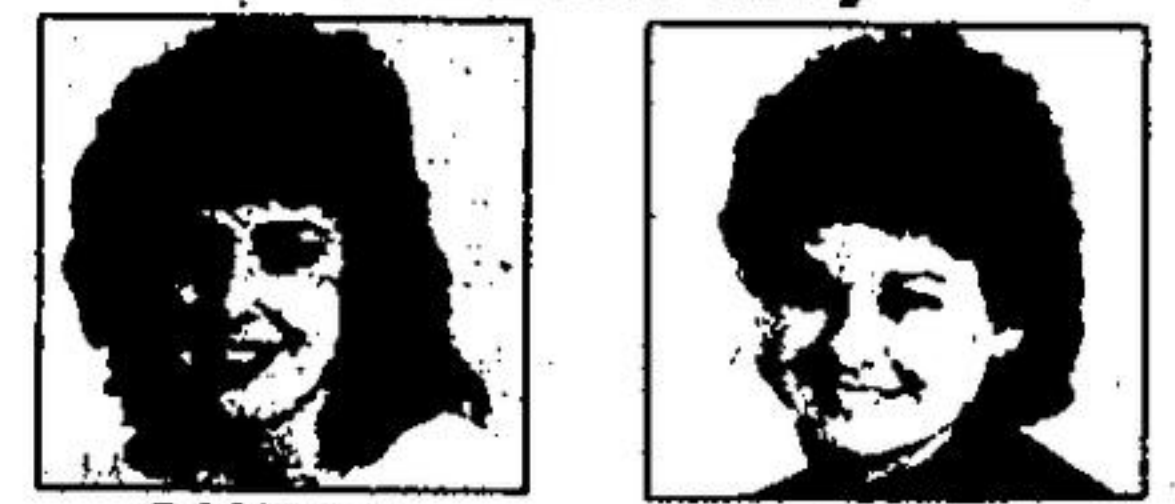

Too many tomatoes from the garden? If you don't have time to cook them now, wash and dry raw ripe tomatoes and freeze on a tray. Since plastic bags when hard they'll be mushy when thawed, but they'll still be good for cooking.

Use baking soda to clean the pipes. Pour a handful into a clogged drain and add a half cup of white vinegar. Let the mixture work a few minutes, then flush with cold water.

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
