established it now sets the stage for Tips from the placing the feet in the correct position. Let's keep this as simple as possible. Golf

You have a choice of three types of stances: 1. both feet are parallel to the target live. 2. The left foot is slightly ahead of the right foot. 3. The right foot is slightly ahead of the left.

In each case the front foot is slightly toed outward while the backfoot is directly perpendicular (square) to your line of flight (for those that lack flexibility in the low back place the back foot so it too is slightly toed outward).

The weight distribution favours the backfoot at address. Why? Well it's because the bottom hand on the club is lower than the top hand therefore there becomes a slight shift in favour of the back foot.

Once your ball position is placed and you take your stance, the only foot which moves will be the back foot. It will become as narrow as shoulder width on a imaginary line drawn down from the shoulder to the outside of the feet to as wide as, shoulder width on an imaginary line drawn down from the shoulder to the inside of the feet. But the position of the stance remains the same (i.e. slightly open, closed, or parallel-the 1st and later are preferable).

Now with a constant clubface position, grip position, ball position and stance we face one more area of concentration and that is posture position.

Please practice those positions on the practice fairway, not on the gold course. make them habit forming and your swing will be as constant and rewarding. Next week the final stage of set-up-the posture position.
