## \$43,000 car, truck crash

A motorist and one of her passengers received minimal injuries last Wednesday morning when the 1976 Cadillac they were riding in collided with a GMC tractor trailer on Main St. South.

Driver Jeanne Bogovic, 16, of RR 1 Georgetown, and passenger Melissa Munn, 15, of RR 2 Acton, were slightly injured in the collision, which sent the tractor trailer sprawling across the side of the road.

Truck driver Dave Robinson, 43, of Loret-

to was not injured. Police set damages at \$40,000 to the tractor trailer and \$3,000 to the Cadillac.

Also escaping injury in the crash was a second passenger in the car, Andrea Bogovic, 15, of RR 1 Georgetown.

Police say the Cadillac was attempting to pass a second car in the southbound lane as it turned onto Cobblehill Rd. The Cadillac veered into the oncoming lane where it struck the northbound truck.

## Vandals damage cars, break windows

Vandals were busy around town during the weekend, giving police eight different cases of wilful damage to investigate, including three separate incidents along Delrex Blvd. in Georgetown.

Damage in Acton was the worst. A beer bottle was thrown through the eight-by-three foot front window of Freezer Frenzy on Mill St. East at about 1.30 a.m. Saturday causing \$100 damage.

Vandals threw rocks through two three-by-four foot windows at M.Z. Bennett Public School on Acton Blvd. late Friday or early Saturday, racking up another \$400 in damage.

In Georgetown, a beer bottle was thrown through the side window of a 1983 Chevrolet pick-up truck driving along Delrex Blvd. near Jessop Ct. The driver was uninjured in the late Saturday night incident, but

damage was set at \$300.

Dirt-filled flower pots and other items were thrown into swimming pools behind two different Delrex Blvd. homes between 1 and 7 a.m. Saturday, for a total of \$115 in damage and cleaning bills.

Also on Delrex, late Saturday or early Sunday, the hood of a parked 1979 Chevy was dented and scratched outside a residence, costing another \$100 in damage.

Sometime late Friday or early Saturday, a ball washer and greens flagpole, together valued at \$120, were damaged at the Georgetown Golf and Country Club.

Sunday about 1 a.m., the headlights of a Ford LTD parked outside the Newfoundland Club on Armstrong Ave. were smashed. Police have a suspect in the incident, which resulted in \$140 in damage.

## Maximum fine . . . is \$2,000 Noise bylaw sent back for rework

A proposed noise by-law which could effectively close all gun clubs in the area has been withdrawn at the request of town councillors and sent back to Town staff for revision.

The five-page document which includes among its restrictions "noise from the repeated discharge of firearms" was present to town council last week, but following a brief debate regarding the implications of the by-law, was withdrawn.

The by-law which received no committee discussion prior to the council meeting, won instant approval from a group of residents who have long complained about noise from the CRQC Trap Club located on 25 Sideroad near Sixth Line.

Martin Burns, solicitor on behalf of one of the neighbours noted, "we are happy the matter is at its conclusion."

He added he hoped the Town would make every effort to enforce the new by-law, prompting discussion among councillors as to how this would occur.

Deputy clerk Bill Roberts said he did not expect any problems or the matter would be brought back to council for a by-law amendment.

Councillor Blanche Hinton noted that although there had been no problems with any other gun club, the new by-law could close any group.

Mr. Roberts then indicated that council could introduce an exemption by-law in that situation.

"How can you exempt one and not the other," questioned Mrs. Hinton.

She was supported by fellow councillors who felt the entire subject should be discussed at a future council meeting.

The by-law includes a lengthy list of restrictions prohibiting noise made by "any animal or bird kept as a pet, kept for sale, boarded or kept for experimental purposes which disturbs or is likely to disturb persons in any office, hospital, or any dwelling, hotel or other type of residence."

"The shouting and crying of peddlers, hawkers and vendors. . . the noise caused by any vehicle so out of repair, so loaded, so secured or operated in such a manner as to create disturbing and unnecessary grating, grinding, rattling or other noise;

"The noise from any air conditioner, installed in any window or wall, between the hours of the following day that is disturbing or likely to disturb persons. . .

"Disturbing or excessive noise in connection with loading or unloading any vehicle or the opening and destruction of bales, boxes, crates and containers;

"No person shall ring bells, blow horns, shout or make or permit unusual noises, or noises likely to disturb the inhabitants or any other person in the vicinity. . .

Contravention of any of the provisions of the by-law could result in a maximum fine of \$2,000.

There are exceptions to the rules including: any military or other band or any parade for which the person responsible has obtained written permission, from Halton Regional Police and the town council;

"Any sound from any private radio in a

motor vehicle installed for the sole benefit or entertainment of the operator and occupants of such vehicle when same is not audible at a distance of eight metres from such vehicle.

"Any case of public necessity.

"The use in a reasonable manner of any apparatus or mechanism for the amplification of the human voice or of music in a public park or any other commodious space in connection with any public election, public celebration; provided written permission of the Council of the said Corporation of the Town of Milton.

The by-law is expected to be discussed at next Monday evening's council meeting.
