The Toronto team notched the first run of the match in the opening inning and then the A's returned fire in the second for a 2-1 edge.


In the top of the third Sam Steel pegged two more runs to grab the lead again. It wasn't until the fourth inning that the A'S could get back into the game with a run by Spear.

Gidman and Uranick outstanding at OFSAA

Both Doreen Uranick and George Gidman were only a fraction of a second out of winning their respective races at the Ontario track finals held last weekend in Etobicoke.

Uranick took second place in the senior girls' 800 metre race, defeated by Elmwood's Elise Braithwaite by 16 / 100 of a second. Braithwaite was runner-up to

Uranick in the junior girls' 800 metre. Uranick's time was 2.06.11, a personal best for her. Both girls broke the OFSAA meet record of 2.09.78, the Canadian Interscholastic record of 2.09.27, and the Canadian Open round of 2.07.4.

"It was an exceptionally good performance," said trainer Bruce Andrews, of

Uranick's race. Uranick also placed third in the senior girls' 400 metre race in a time of 57.32, .72 seconds off her personal best for the race. It was extremely windy and the 400 metre is not Uranick's event, so Andrews was "quite pleased" with the placing, he said.

"Our goal was just to make the finals in that event," he said.

In the senior boys' 800 metre Gidman was beat out by Agincourt's Rob Kichuk by 36. 100 of a second. Gidman ran a new personal best with a time of 1.53.23.

Teresa Dunn ranked in the top 20 in the senior girls' shot-put. Her best throw was 9.94 metres.

Uranick has qualified for the Canadian Junior Championships to be held in Edmonton July 20 and 21. Gidman is 8 / 10 of a second off the qualifying standard and hopes to be competing as well.

The Junior Nationals is a qualifying meet for the Canadian Junior Panamerican Games in Nassau, Bahamas in August. Andrews believes Gidman and Uranick have a chance to qualify.

Gidman and Uranick will also be attending the Canadian Senior National Championships in Winnipeg June 30 to July 1. The meet is also the Olympic trials, but that is not why the two runners are attending, says Andrews. They are attending to gain experience and to try to run personal best times, he said.

"Our primary objective is to get through the heats and get to the final, then they'll have the opportunity to run personal best times.

Uranick's time is close to international callbre, while Gidman's ranks him number two in Ontario and in the top 10 in Canada for junior boys, sald Andrews.

Both can improve their personal best times before the summer racing season is complete, he said.

The OFSAA championship meet was Gidman's last high school meet. Gidman, 19, will be graduating this year, and he hopes to attend York University for general studies.

If he is accepted, he will be close enough to home to be able to continue training with Andrews, keeping the agreement made when Andrews started training Uranick and Gidman to stay together for approximately 10 years and see how far they could get.


Halton ladies doubled 10-5
