

Health boards back legal heroin

The Association of Ontario Boards of Health has overwhelmingly endorsed Halton Region's call for the legalization of heroin for use by the terminally ill.

Forwarded to the Association by Regional Council just last week, the resolution initiated by the Halton Health Department earned almost unanimous support at the Association's annual convention June 6.

Boosting support for the move was guest speaker Irene Pirocchi of Hamilton, a terminally ill cancer patient who attested to the severe pain she faces despite prescribed medication.

Former Halton Medical Officer of Health Peter Cole, now serving in that position with

Peel Region, told delegates from 35 Ontario health units at the convention that heroin is an "excellent drug" beneficial to "a number of patients who would not be helped otherwise."

Halton council endorsed Dr. Cole's plea for heroin's legalization last December, noting that other countries continue to use the drug to treat terminally ill patients and find it helpful in reducing disease-related pain.

Halton's resolution also asserted that "heroin is unlikely to be any more of a problem than other drugs that are presently available for pain control as far as addiction is concerned."

Canada banned the drug outright in 1956.
