Meeting over country inn issue

A compromise to the controversy over the proposed Rockwood country inn may be reached today (Wednesday) when the developer, Stone Barn Holding; Mort Rapp, a citizen; Eramosa Town council and their consultants (Dryden and Smith); and ministry staff meet with the Minister of Treaury, Economics, and Intergovernmental Affairs at Queen's Park.

The proposal is on the east side of the Eramosa River, off 7 Highway.

Citizens voiced their concerns about the last Tuesday at the first meeting of the Eramosa Resident's Association.

Mort Rapp, a Rockwood resident for seven years, is concerned about the possible disruption of the town's "peace and tranquility."

He cited an Orangeville's inn and McLaughlin Square in Oshawa as two failing inn / residence ventures which turned to loud entertainment to survive, disturbing residents.

Rapp stressed the importance of preventing such circumstances by writing protections into the original enabling by-

The proposed inn will contain 100 rooms, licensed dining facilities, cocktail lounges, patio bars, a club, and a retail store. Stone Barn Holdings, owners of the land, have proposed renovating the house on the property as an inn, and the barn as a building in which to hold meetings and conventions.

Swimming pools and tennis courts have

also been proposed, along with parking facilities.

Joyce Hill, along with other members of the ERA steering committee, has begun a study of the history of the hotel / motel industry in Southern Ontario. After some investigation of similar hotel / motel ideas as that suggested for Rockwood, she said area hotels have gone through three to four owners before they became viable

"We're looking at how viable this business will be and if we are going to find outselves with something that people are going to walk away from," Hill said.

A 30-unit housing development has also been proposed for the property and an area surrounding the houses and inn can be used as a recreation area for cross-country skiing in winter and hiking in summer.

Rapp also expressed concern over the supply of water and the capacity of the sewage facilities in Rockwood to accommodate the development.

"There's more than enough (water and sewage (acllities)," said John Salmon, Eramosa Township's Chief Building

The exit to the proposed inn has been approved by the Minister of Transportation. but Rapp is concerned that there is only one exit road, which leads onto Main St. at the end of the bridge.

The possibility of loud entertainment is still a major concern of Rapp's.

John Salmon said he hopes a compromise can be reached today.

"If we continue to prohibit things because of other things that have happened, we wouldn't get anything done," Salmon said.


Mr. Dobbie's mother was organist at the

We hope that little Vincent Sautiere will recover quickly after his stay in Georgetown Hospital,



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
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


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
