She will not be idle after her retirement. Her hobbies include skiing, swimming, golf, travelling and reading.


Police blotter

14 Acton students among graduates from Sheridan

A record 1,875 students including 14 from Acton and area graduated in the 16th annual convocation ceremonies at Sheridan College's Oakville and Brampton campuses. Lawrence Benville and Gladys Stoneham from Acton were silver medalists.

In a convocation address at the Oakville Campus June 13, Norman Williams, Chairman, Ontario Council of Regents for Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology, told graduates they represented "a major revolution in education".

Williams noted the introduction of the community college system in 1967, "departed from a system that has been around for over 100 years."

He felt that while college education was originally perceived as "second best", the 1970s "gave us an unexpected trend in which students were leaving universities to enrol in community colleges."

"Why? Because 90 per cent of community college graduates were finding work while the job prospects for university students were declining, a trend that continues
