Lorella, 19, a graduate of Acton District High School, served as vice-president of the Oakville student senate last year. As president she wants to improve communication between the senate and the student body, provide more assistance to students with problems at the college and increase the number of activities on campus for the community.

The most active election campaign to date resulted in 670 ballots cast, representing 25 per cent of the total student population at the Oakville Campus.

Lorella won the April 5 election with 390 votes, giving her a wide margin over two other contenders. Robin Woodward received 200 votes and Sue Bock received 72.

The new vice-president is Roy Howarth, of Oakville, a second year Business Administration student who won the \$1 prize.
